

STATE REPUBLICANS WANT ROOSEVELT

Will Endorse His Candidacy for Re-nomination for President.

HON. H. S. CHUBB TALKS

Declares Press Reports to Effect That Florida Delegation Would Stand for Nomination of Secretary Taft Wrong—Praise for the President.

Apropos the recent visit of Hon. Mr. Hitchcock to this State, and his conference with many of the leading Republicans in Florida, among whom was Hon. Henry S. Chubb, receiver of the United States land office in this city, and chairman of the Republican State Central Committee, the correspondent called upon Mr. Chubb relative to the statement made through the press that at a recent meeting of the leading Republicans it was agreed to stand by Secretary Taft for the Presidency at the next national convention.

Mr. Chubb is a power and a recognized leader of his party in this State, hence is in close touch with every Republican of the commonwealth.

The correspondent found Mr. Chubb comfortably seated at a desk in his private office looking over some papers, and when the nature of the visit was explained he expressed a willingness to give an interview which would set the matter correctly before the people of the country.

"I note by press reports that the Republican leaders of the State held a meeting in Jacksonville recently, at which it was agreed that the Florida delegation in the next Republican National Convention would support Secretary Taft for President," ventured the reporter.

"That statement was absolutely incorrect," promptly replied Mr. Chubb. "The reporter was either misinformed, or was indulging in romance. The Republicans of Florida are unanimously and enthusiastically for the re-nomination of President Roosevelt, and are now considering no other candidate, as he is recognized as the greatest President who ever occupied the White House."

"But has not the present occupant of the White House stated that he is not, and will not be a candidate?"

"Yes, that is correct, and the President is an honest, conscientious man, and meant every word he said, in his statement on election night. But the Republican party and the American people demand a President for the next four years, commencing March 4th, 1909, who has the courage and the great ability necessary to complete the Panama Canal, strengthen the rate bill, enforce the pure food law and regulate trusts and gigantic corporations, and it is now fully realized, not only by Republicans, but by a large army of Democrats, that
