

A JAIL DELIVERY IN CITRUS COUNTY

Twelve Prisoners Escape from the Inverness Jail.

A VERY PECULIAR OCCURRENCE

Immediately After Escape Was Effectuated, One Prisoner Notified Sheriff Graham—Every Prisoner in Jail Escaped With One Exception.

Hernando, May 8.—Twelve prisoners confined in the jail at Inverness, effected their escape Tuesday night by tearing up the sink in the jail.

The sink was old and rusty, and by some means the prisoners secured a large pipe wrench, and it was used as a lever to pry the sink up.

All the prisoners escaped except one, and he was too large to go through the opening made. One prisoner, as soon as he was out of jail, went to Sheriff Graham's residence and notified him of the escape.

A thorough search is being made for the escaped prisoners.

Former Sheriff Carter, who was suspended some time ago, will, it is understood, be reinstated May 10th.


The fare will be 60 cents for adults and 30 cents for children, round trip, and indications are that a large number will avail themselves of the opportunity, as the public generally is invited.

Third Day of Session Occupied Largely in Trial of One Civil Case.

The third day of the session of the spring term of the Circuit Court developed but little, almost the entire day being occupied by one case, that of L. C. Gracy vs. F. P. Henderson, replevin of certain cross-ties, in which a verdict was rendered for the plaintiff.

Fast Train Ditched.

Holly, Colo., May 8.—The Colorado limited, eastbound, on the Santa Fe, was ditched one mile east of Medway, Monday night by spreading rails. The train was running at an unusually high rate of speed, being six hours late. All of the nine cars except the last Pullman sleeper, turned over. A porter and baggageman were hurt. The passengers of the wrecked train were brought to Holly.

Diaz's Mother-in-Law Dead.

City of Mexico, May 8.—Mrs. Augustine Castello de Romero Rubio, the mother of Mrs. Diaz, wife of the president of this republic, died on Sunday, after an illness of but a few hours. President Diaz and Mrs. Diaz and numerous relatives were at the bedside when the end came. Her death was due to pneumonia.

Tornado in Texas.

Ft. Worth, Tex., May 8.—A storm of wind and rain which was general throughout a considerable area in northern Texas, and which, at some places, assumed the proportion of a tornado, according to meager reports received here, has resulted in the loss of three lives, the injury of many persons and great damage to property and crops.

FATAL TRAIN CRASH.

Trains Collide on B. & O. With Disastrous Results.

Wheeling, W. Va., May 8.—Train No. 7, on the Baltimore and Ohio, westbound, collided with a fast freight train eastbound at Rosby's Rock, 18 miles east of here, Tuesday morning.

Thomas Painter, of Burton, W. Va., the express messenger, and C. C. Warner, baggagemaster of Bellaire, O., were killed outright. C. F. Reilly, engineer of the passenger train, of Wheeling, was fatally injured. The accident is alleged to have been caused by a misunderstanding of orders.

The two trains were going at 30 miles an hour when they crashed.

The baggage and express cars were demolished. The freight engine also demolished the passenger engine.

The passengers in the coaches and the Pullman sleeper escaped, with a severe shaking up.

No. 7 is a through passenger train from Chicago, and is made up of three Pullmans, two day coaches, a baggage car and a mail car.
