

ALABAMA WOMAN KILLS HUSBAND

Turpentine Operator Meets Death for Pulling Wife's Hair.

THE MAN WAS INTOXICATED

When He Returned Home, According to Wife's Story, and Objected to Arrangement of Her Hair—Man Well Known.

Newton, Ala., July 31.—Because he objected to his wife's arranging her hair in a Pompadour, Joseph Given's wife, who is well known and probably the wealthiest turpentine operator in Alabama, was shot dead by his outraged helpmate last Sunday. Mrs. Given is young and prettier than a number of an old and wealthy family. She has not been married, and will probably not be.

According to Mrs. Given's story her husband came home under the influence of liquor. She had just finished arranging her hair, and the style attracted his attention.

"You never to dress your hair that way," she alleges he

said to me by the hair,] his wife, "pulled me to my knees and told me he was going to kill me away and run, but he was pulling my hair. I was a woman and I had to do it to save my life."

Shooting Affray Results From Recent Prohibition Election.

Valdosta, Ga., July 31.—Will O'Brien, a son of John O'Brien, one of the wealthiest citizens of this section, shot and probably fatally wounded his brother-in-law, Mr. McEachern, at the home of John O'Brien on Sunday afternoon at a late hour.

It is understood that there have been serious differences between the two men ever since the prohibition election a month ago, on of them being an anti-prohibitionist and the other a prohibitionist. O'Brien was drinking heavily and he is considered the aggressor of the difficulty. Three balls from a pistol entered the body of McEachern, and the physicians say he will die from the wounds.


