

"SHADOW OF THE CROSS."

The Unexplained Miracle Picture at Jamestown Exposition.

The many visitors at Jamestown will find "In the Shadow of the Cross" one of the real novelties of the great exposition. It is an exhibition on The Warpath, and is being viewed with wonder and amazement by many thousands.

"In the Shadow of the Cross" was painted by Henry Hammond All, who studied and painted in the art centers of the Old World for many years, devoting his talents mainly to genre subjects.

In September, 1906, he returned to America, his native land, and established his studio in a New England city, where for some time he painted principally portraits and landscapes.

Acting under the influence of some friends, he turned his attention to religious subjects, and among others commenced painting a full length figure of Christ, his object being to produce an ideal portrait of the Christ man. At first he did not succeed in attaining his ideal, and the canvas stood a source of trouble and vexation to him.

Numerous visitors were received at his studio, and among them a well-known lecturer on Biblical characters who became intensely interested in this picture and tried to make the artist understand the appearance of Christ as revealed to him in a vivid dream.

All in vain, however, until one day the artist was suddenly impressed with the realization that he had at last conceived the idea sought after. Immediately rising, he painted the wonderful countenance of Christ which is seen in the painting.

Anxious to know what the lecturer would say about the change, he sent for him. On entering the studio the lecturer went into raptures over the picture, exclaiming: "Now you have painted Christ as I saw Him."

Not long afterwards the artist, having to go to his studio at night for some sheets of music, was astounded to discover on entering that his picture could be distinctly seen in the dark, and that Christ appeared to be walking in a pale moonlight, while above and behind could be seen a cross.

His first impression was that the moon was shining through an open window upon the painting, and that the cross was a shadow. He soon discovered a strange cross in connection with this picture, and having used only well-known pigments, he soon realized that this strange quality of his picture was beyond his power to explain. He was so profoundly impressed that he refused to finish it, and the picture remains unfinished to this day.

Well Known Composer Dead.

Bergen, Norway, Sept. 5.—Edward Hagerup Grieg, the composer, died here Wednesday. He intended sailing for Christiania Tuesday and his baggage was already on board a steamer when he complained of feeling ill and the symptoms appearing serious, he was removed to a hospital where he died. Mr. Grieg was born at Bergen in 1843, of Scotch ancestry and received his musical education at Liepzig and Copenhagen.

SMITHS, BROWNS, BLACKS.

They Make a Good Showing in New York's City Directory.

New York, Sept. 5.—Every member of the Smith family will be gratified with the showing it has made in the one hundred and twenty-first volume of the general directory of Manhattan and the Bronx, now being distributed, for it is holding its own as a family in the lead in numbers over the other families.

There are thirty-seven volumes of the new directory devoted to the Smith family.

In the colors, the Browns and Browns lead by a comfortable margin. There are twenty columns of these; and the Whites come next, with ten and a half columns; there are eight columns of Greens and Greens, while the Blacks and Grays break even with three columns.

There are approximately 500,000 names in the book, which would indicate a population of 2,500,000 in Manhattan and the Bronx, two of the five boroughs of Greater New York.

But French Fire Mowed Them Down Like Chaff.

Casa Blanca, Sept. 5.—Tuesday, both Frenchmen were killed and it would be an engagement outside the camp.

The dead include Major Provost, of the first battalion of the foreign legion, and Lieutenant Benizzers of the second battalion of Moroccan sharpshooters.

The Moors concentrated the largest force they had yet mustered in this vicinity and returned to the attack again and again after encountering the deadly defense of the artillery and machine guns. The enemy's losses are described as enormous.

The fighting was started by an attack made by the Moors on a French scouting party.

Light Company for Americus.

Atlanta, Sept. 5.—Americus, in Sumter county, is going to have a great light and power company. Secretary of State Phil Cook on Tuesday, issued a charter for the Americus Railway and Power company, capitalized at \$250,000, which will build four miles of street car line, put in a thoroughly up-to-date lighting plant and in addition will pump water for the city for the next twenty years.

Six in One Week.

Alliance, Ohio, Sept. 5.—Harry Lester, aged 39, of this city, a brakeman on the Pennsylvania railroad, was killed at Mansfield Tuesday morning. Tuesday afternoon Johnson Orrie, aged 82, was killed in the Pennsylvania yards here. This makes six persons who have been killed here within the past week by trains.
