Everyone is Delighted at Appointment of Prof. W. S. Cawthon.

Announcement was made in The Sun of Tuesday morning that Superintendent Dr. J. L. Kelley had appointed Prof. W. S. Cawthon, of the University of Florida, and one of the most capable educators of the State, to the principalship of the Gainesville Graded and High School.

This announcement seemed to please everyone interested in the welfare of the school, as Prof. Cawthon is a man well known in this section, having been connected with the University ever since the institution was established here.

Prof. Cawthon is very much pleased over the appointment, as he has expressed himself. He is going into the work with a vigor and earnestness which must mean success, and pays a high compliment to his associates by saying that no better can be found anywhere.

The school will open in regular order on Monday morning, and both faculty and students will enter the work with a determination to make the most successful and beneficial term in the history of the institution. Gainesville has the advantage of having a most energetic and ambitious lot of pupils, and as the faculty is also ambitious and energetic, we may expect a gratifying success of the coming term.

"I have studied the personnel of the faculty well," remarked Prof. Cawthon to a Sun representative Tuesday, "and I can flatter myself in the assertion that I believe I have the best all-round faculty in the State. They are all good, conscientious, hard workers of ability, and there is no reason why we should not come out at the end of the season with flying colors. I am going to work in harmony with the faculty and students, and there is no reason that we will not all work in harmony together."

Jake Moore, a negro who was arrested some time during last fall upon a charge of obstructing the Seaboard Air Line track at Campville by piling crossties upon the same, and who has been out under bond, was turned over to Sheriff Fennell Tuesday by his bondsmen, and is now in jail.

Moore will be held awaiting action of the grand jury at the fall term of the circuit court in November.

**Marshal Arnow's Report.**

Those who think Marshal Arnow does not properly attend to his duties, evidently do not know what they are talking about. This efficient officer is ever on the alert for the interests and safety of those whom he was elected to protect, with the result that it has come to the point where those inclined to break the law are watchful of his whereabouts.

Marshal Arnow turned in his report for September to the Council Monday night, which, although may not look so creditable to the morals of the city, shows at least a credit to the diligence of the police force.

The report shows that during the month there occurred twenty-eight arrests, from which fines and costs derived aggregated \$108.75. There were twenty-seven head of cattle and hogs arrested for the violation of the ordinance prohibiting them from running on the streets, and the impounding fees amounted to \$13.50. The total business for the month ran to a total of \$121.75.
