SENATOR MALLORY.

The Pensacola Journal pays the following tribute to Senator Mallory:

"The announcement of Senator S. R. Mallory that he will not be a candidate for re-election to the United States Senate, which is made through the columns of The Journal today, will be received with regret by that gentleman's friends all over Florida.

"The Senator has been in ill health for some time, but his friends had hoped that he would recover in sufficient time to make an active canvass for re-election. His present illness, however, has been such that, on the advice of his physician, he deems it best to definitely announce that he will not be in the race.

"The announcement is characteristic of the man and it does credit to that high ethical conception of duty, both to himself and to others, which has always been a part of his private and his public life. It was not incumbent on Senator Mallory to make this announcement at this time, and there are few men who would have done so. We say, few men who would have done so; and we base the statement on the fact that there are few who ever have done such a thing.

"Had Senator Mallory desired to play politics—either in his own interest or in that of someone else—he could have let this matter drift along until the time of the primaries. He may be entirely recovered by that time. Every citizen of the State will hope that he may be. But whether recovered or not, he could have used the interim to advantage in many ways simply by covering up his intentions and keeping the people, as well as the candidates, in ignorance of the situation.

"Many others would have done this, but Senator Mallory long ago demonstrated that he had nothing in his make-up in common with the average man who seeks or holds public office. He has never known what it meant to 'play politics.' In his long political career, no man can truthfully say that Stephen R. Mallory ever took an unfair or unworthy advantage of a political opponent. He is not made of that kind of stuff. He despises pretense and hypocrisy of every kind. He never used public office for his own personal advancement, and no act or policy of his was ever shaped for the purpose of aiding his political fortunes. His public acts have always been dictated by that overpowering characteristic of the man to do what he conceived to be right, regardless of how it might affect him personally or politically.

"These are some of the things that have endeared Stephen R. Mallory to the people of Florida. They are among the things that made his friends love him as a man and make them loyal to him as a public servant.

"His announcement not to be a candidate for re-election is, under the circumstances, perfectly in accord with every policy of his past political life, and it is a fitting sequence to a record that has in many respects been one of the most—if not the most—remarkable in the annals of American politics. Elected to the United States Senate ten years ago without ever having been a candidate for the office, and without the expenditure of a nickel in the interest of his election, being the one man in the whole State upon whom a majority of the discordant elements of that discordant time were able to consolidate; being re-elected without opposition four years ago; serving with distinction for ten years in the highest branch of the greatest legislative body of the world; and now declining voluntarily to allow his name to be used for re-election
