

WATSON NOMINATED

Populists Name Georgian For the Presidency.

HE MAKES ATTACK ON BRYAN

Mr. Watson Was Notified by Judge Jay W. Forrest, of Albany, N. Y., of His Nomination for the Presidency and Accepts.

Atlanta, July 11.—Hon. Thomas E. Watson was notified of his nomination for the presidency by the populist party, the notification speech being made by Judge Jay W. Forrest, of Albany, N. Y., and in an address which covered national issues in a vigorous and comprehensive fashion accepted the nomination.

During the morning the populists of Georgia gathered for the state convention, which was to have begun at 10 o'clock. The heavy rain caused delay in the arrival, and it was not until after 11 o'clock that the call to order was made.

The whole morning was taken up with the address by Mr. Watson, in which he varied a discussion of state issues with a vigorous attack on William J. Bryan for his stand on the Brownsville affair, asked for Georgia's vote in the November election, said he intended to dominate the politics of the state for the next ten years and hoped to give Georgia the best government in the union, made a plea for the restoration of the south to the place it once held in the councils of the nation, and gave an account of his stewardship and the reasons which have kept him in the political limelight.

At the afternoon session, which began at 4 o'clock, the executive committee, composed of two delegates from each of the eleven congressional districts were named. The eleven members of the committee from the state-at-large will be named by the chairman, J. J. Holloway.

The executive committee will confer with Mr. Watson and they will make the selection for the electors from Georgia.

Various resolutions consumed the time of the meeting, and the platform speech of General J. S. Coxy was not heard.

MURDERER USED HATCHET.

New Orleans Hair Dresser Murdered in His Sleep.

New Orleans, La., July 11.—After lying for nearly twenty-four hours in the rear of a little hair-dressing shop at 219 Bourbon street, the body of Alphonse Durel was found Thursday afternoon in a badly mutilated condition. Near by lay a bloody hatchet, evidently the weapon used by the murderer.

Investigation showed that Durel's shop apparently had been robbed and the police began a search for a negro woman cook, who works in the neighborhood, but who has disappeared. Durel was for many years the proprietor of a fashionable hair-dressing establishment in the old French quarter.

Various circumstances combined to reduce his extensive trade to a very modest patronage, and he finally came to occupy the little shop where his body was found. Neighbors who missed him started an investigation, which resulted in the discovery of the body.

Seaboard Train Wrecked.

Jacksonville, Fla., July 11.—Passenger train No. 36 of the Seaboard Air Line railway, northbound from Jacksonville, ran into an open switch near Yulee, striking a coal car and badly damaging the train. The fireman, John Young, negro, was caught between the engine and tender and instantly killed; the engineer had his collar bone broken, and several passengers were injured.

ties as common carriers and prevent discrimination and extortion.

Labor and Injunction.
Experience has proven the necessity of a modification of the present law relating to injunctions, and we reiterate the pledge of our national platforms of 1896 and 1904 in favor of the measure which passed the United States senate in 1896, but which a republican congress has ever since refused to enact, relating to contempt in federal courts and providing for trial by jury in cases of indirect contempt.

We favor the eight hour day on all government work.

We pledge the democratic party to the enactment of a law by congress, as far as the federal jurisdiction extends, for a general employers' liability act, covering injury to body or loss of life of employees.

We pledge the democratic party to the enactment of a law creating a department of labor represented separately in the president's cabinet, which, department shall include the subject of mines and mining.

Civil Service.
The laws pertaining to the civil service should be honestly and rigidly enforced, to the end that merit and ability shall be the standard of appointment and promotion, rather than services rendered to a political party.

Stands for Democracy.

The democratic party stands for democracy, the republican party has drawn to itself all that is aristocratic and plutocratic. The democratic party is the champion of civil rights and opportunities to all; the republican party is the party of privilege and private monopoly. The democratic party listens to the voice of the whole people and gauges progress by the prosperity and advancement of the average man; the republican party is subservient to the comparatively few, who are beneficiaries of governmental favorites. We invite the co-operation of all, regardless of previous political affiliation or past differences, who desire to preserve a government of the people, by the people and for the people, and who favor such an administration of the government as will insure, as far as human wisdom can, that each citizen shall draw from society a reward commensurate with his contribution to the welfare of society.
