

FLORIDA NEWS

Seven hundred arrests were made in Pensacola during the month of June, which is the largest ever before known in that city.

Announcement is made that the July meeting of the Georgia-Florida Sawmill Association will be held at the Continental Hotel at Atlantic Beach.

A motorman on an electric beach car at Fernandina was seriously wounded last Thursday by handling a loaded pistol carelessly. The pistol was accidentally discharged, the ball penetrating the knee-cap.

As a result of running into an open switch a few yards north of Yulee Thursday morning at 10 o'clock, Seaboard Air Line north-bound train No. 34 was derailed, the negro fireman, John Young, killed, and the engineer's collar bone fractured. The fireman was jammed between the tender and engine and instantly killed.

The Tampa Sulphur Springs Traction Company have signed an agreement with the city council of Tampa to construct a bridge over the Hillsborough river into West Tampa. The bridge will be a steel structure, and will be made with ample room for electric cars and foot passengers to cross it. Work will begin immediately.

The city council of Lakeland passed an ordinance Wednesday evening, calling for an election for the issuance of municipal bonds, at an early date. The amount of the proposed issue will be \$40,000, which will be used for public improvements as follows: New school building and addition to the large brick building now in use, \$15,000; additions and extensions to water works system, \$15,000; paving and improving streets, \$5,000; additions and extensions to electric light plant, \$5,000.

Nina Quartaro, an Italian girl, 12 years of age, met with a serious accident, which caused the amputation of her left leg at the knee. The girl, while talking to a companion, stepped onto the track of the Tampa Electric Company, at the corner of Fortune street and Highland avenue, in Tampa, and was knocked down by a passing car, having her leg badly crushed from the knee to the ankle. Physicians were immediately summoned, who decided it was necessary to amputate the limb, which was done, the amputation being a most successful one.

The mysterious disappearance of Julius W. Jackson of Melbora, who has been missing from home since July 2, was cleared when the dead man's body was found by Sheriff Rickerson and Deputy Morgan in a cotton field about one hundred yards from the house of the murdered man last Friday. Sheriff Rickerson, who has been working on the case since Mr. Jackson was reported missing, arrested Jackson's father-in-law, John Taylor, and his two sons, Buford and Herbert Taylor, 20 and 18 years of age respectively, and lodged them in jail charged with the crime. The father and the two boys have made a full confession but claim they acted in self-defense, but will make no statement for publication other than they were justified in killing Jackson.

GEORGE TAYLOR HAS RECOVERED HIS PIPE

After It Had Remained at the Bottom of a Natural Well Fifteen Years.

HAD TURNED PERFECTLY WHITE

When Mr. George Fleming Cleaned Out Well, Which Had Gone Dry, the Pipe and Numerous Other Articles Were Recovered Therefrom.

A natural well on the place of Mr. George Fleming of Archer having gone dry, that gentleman decided to have the whole cleaned out. When the work was completed it was found that he had taken from the bottom of the well several large well buckets, a number of smaller ones, a quantity of chain, a foot tub, and other articles too numerous to mention, among them being a fine meerschaum pipe which George L. Taylor had lost in the well fifteen years ago. When the pipe was accidentally dropped in the well it was beautifully colored, but when recovered it was its natural color—white. Mr. Taylor is naturally happy over the recovery of his long-lost pipe and has been enjoying it for the past few days as he never enjoyed it before.

These natural wells are numerous in Alachua county and many property owners obtain their water supply from them. They are supplied by subterranean streams, which, like the fickle maiden, sometimes "go back" on those who depend upon them, and then the farmer has to haul water until he can have a pump sunk, for where these natural wells are found, it is generally at least fifty feet below the surface where water is obtained. They are great curiosities in some sections of the county, and it is said that some years ago a bottle with a note placed in it was thrown into one of these wells in the western part of Alachua county and the same was some days later picked up by a vessel in the Gulf of Mexico. In another instance a cat was thrown into one of them and afterwards picked up alive in the Suwannee river, some fishermen having observed the feline as it was making for the bank.

GIRL PROVED A HEROINE.

Rescued Her Father and Her Uncle from Drowning.

Portland, Ore., July 14.—Cora Hosford, fourteen years old, Sunday at Washougal, Washington, rescued her father, Captain Hosford, W. B. Patterson, her uncle, and Mildred Long, her half-sister, who were in swimming. The Long girl became exhausted and Captain Hosford went to her assistance. The girl's struggles exhausted him and he cried for help and Patterson went to assist him. Captain Hosford himself was exhausted, and Miss Hosford swam to him and bore him in safety to the shore. By this time Patterson had become exhausted in his efforts to save the struggling girl and his little niece plunged into the water, swam to him, seized her uncle by his hair and towed him to shore, where he was resuscitated. She then went back and secured the body of the Long girl. The latter, however, was past reviving.
