### HISTORIC EVENT AT THE BAIRD.

Ponce de Leon Anniversary to Be Reproduced at Opera House.

Never before has Gainesville had brought within its very gates such a magnificent display of Florida's history as the presentation of the Ponce de Leon Celebration that Manager Kaibald introduces on Monday night at the Baird Theatre.

This was the three hundred and ninety-seventh anniversary of this, one of Florida's most noted historical events. We read it in history, have it reproduced by the inhabitants every year, and now it has been produced by electric photography. Every small child has studied it. Afterwards their fathers and mothers, and lots go yearly to see the Ancient City and the wonderful celebration of its very beginning. The press cannot print the many little scenes as they were displayed by those in the years gone by, nearly forgotten by some, but have been resurrected by others every year by a counterpart of participants of those times.

Scores of visitors from all over the United States witness this grand spectacle.

The Ponce de Leon Celebration was celebrated March 31st, April 1st and 2nd at St. Augustine. These films show the landing of Ponce de Leon, the Attack of Chief Osceola and his tribe of Indians on St. Augustine, which at that time was only a small village. When nightly raids were made on the settlers' homes by this tribe the most exciting scene was the capture of that noted chief, when, in his war paint, razed before him havoc and destruction.

Just to think how wonderful this city has grown with its palatial hotels, of which Florida may boast of the finest in America, which are shown in these pictures, while the streets are crowded with hundreds of Spanish knights and soldiers in medieval costume, English and French of the Continental period, and the United States bands who were ordered to St. Augustine to participate in this enormous program. Large tribes of Indians, militia cadets and band of the Kentucky Military Institute, the finest drilled body of men outside of West Point, all these go to show the various forces that have occupied St. Augustine at times, and who now rehearse these magnificent pyrotechnic displays yearly. Notice in the pictures your friends, perhaps yourself in the grand illuminated parade on the streets by day and the bay by night, which is lit up by the brilliantly illuminated launches, which will be seen in the pictures. The race or water parade just before the races by high-speed motor boats proved one of the greatest additions to the celebration in the day-time, while at night these same motor boats formed a part of the flotilla of torpedo boats which bombarded Fort Marion, so well protected by the land forces.

Little is left to say, only that you should see this wonderful exhibition to fully realize what the Ponce de Leon Celebration really was.

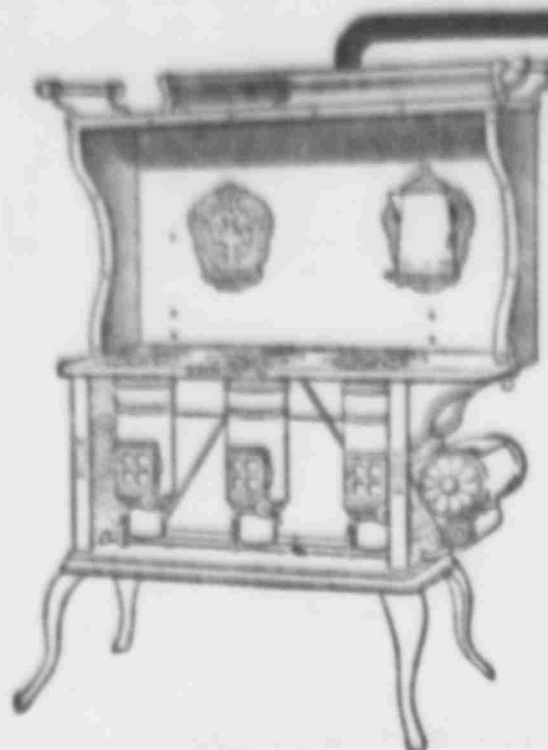

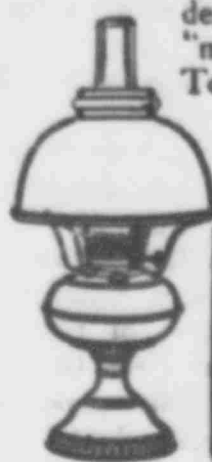
