SOLLAR TUESDAY NIGHT.

seriously shot by Boyer George,
another negro, shortly after both part-
ies had left the train at Arredondo
Tuesday night.

They had previously engaged in hot
words over a woman. Rebecca Gibbs,
and the shooting was the direct
cause of the trouble between the two
men, both of whom had been drinking
during the day and were more
or less under the influence of "house-
wine" at the time.

Boyer stated that she was employ-
ed by Solar to do his cooking, and George
was jealous because she
would not wait upon him, and for
this he managed to pick a quarrel
between them on the train, but failed
to go further with the affair until
after they had reached Arredondo.

He first made his attempt to kill her,
drawing the pistol and stating that unless she would quit Solar and
go with him he would kill her,
whereupon Solar appeared upon the
scene and at once began firing at
the man, emptying his gun of five
rounds, part of which took effect in
the right thigh.

Following the shooting George
made his escape and had not been
captured up to a late hour yester-
day, but it is thought that he is only
laying out hiding until a few days
when he will again put in his appear-
ance.
