CROP ABOUT GATHERED.

All of the Larger Growers Have Com-
pleted Picking Cotton.

From T. H. Cato of Alachua the
reporter learned Thursday that about
all of the farmers in that section had
completed gathering their cotton and
the fields will now be turned into
pasturage.

Especially is this the case with the
larger growers, remarked Mr. Cato,
and they have in very few instances
made one-third of what they should
have gathered on the acreage that
was planted. Although prices have
been fairly good, it is known that in
some cases the people have not aver-
aged a bale of cotton to fifteen acres
of land planted, and this state of af-
fairs has truly been very discouraging
to the grower.

The highest prices received in the
seed at Alachua was 6 1/2 cents last
week, but it has now dropped back
to 6 cents.

MADE GOOD TIME.

Elmer McCreary "Runs Automobile
Some" From Newberry.

Elmer McCreary, in company with
F. M. Frewitt, Otis Thompson and W.
L. Denham, made a business trip to
Newberry on Thursday in the interest
of this paper, and during this trip Mr.
McCreary made fast time in his
automobile from Newberry to Gaines-
ville.

Notwithstanding that the roads are
very dry, and in particularly bad con-
dition, the return trip was made from
that point in just fifty minutes, includ-
ing two short stops. The distance
covered is just a little over eighteen
miles, and about six miles of this road
is yet to be paved, the greater part
of it being in the heaviest kind of
sand, but this he managed to get
through on high gear, never once let-
ting up for it.

The trip over there, when Tioga
was touched, along with the turpen-
tine camp of the Cummer Lumber
Company, was made in one hour, out-
side of stops, and this is about the
best record made by any machine that
has so far traveled the Tioga road to
Newberry.

Old-Time Darkey Known All Over the
Country Visits Gainesville.

The familiar figure of the old col-

the past forty-five years as "Lightning

not look much older than he did
thirty-three years ago.
