A Tribute to Jefferson B. Browne, Of Key West, Candidate For Governor.


In the handling of this petition I received several valuable suggestions from Commissioner Browne, these I acted upon. The other two petitions were local in character, affecting Gainesville only. Both were granted, one of these settled without formal hearing, and saved for our shippers several thousand dollars every year.

So little publicity is given the doings of the Railroad Commissioners, that facts like the foregoing are seldom known to other than those directly interested.

On several occasions since announcing my candidacy for the legislature, I have been asked my reason for waiting so long before making an announcement. It may be there are others who would like to know why I waited so long to enter the campaign. Here it is in a nutshell: Our Circuit Court was approaching, and I was interested as attorney in some heavy litigation—a large proportion of which did not come to trial because of a settlement in one way or another two or three days before court convened. In fact, I had all that I could stand up under, and believing, as I have always believed, that when a lawyer assumes charge of another's business, he owes his client a sacred duty, I felt that it was impossible for me to discharge my whole duty in matters before the courts, and at the same time do myself justice in a political way, hence my determination to wait until after the adjournment of court before

making the announcement of my candidacy. I have never been able to mix politics with business.

I have not made a personal canvass of any portion of the county. I have not had the time. Then too, I am generally known throughout the county, and those that know me know pretty well whether or not they want to support me, and where one is generally known, the wisdom of such a canvass is doubted by many.

If elected to the legislature, it will be my ambition to serve the people of both county and State to the very best of my ability. In all of my acts I shall be honest with the people of Florida, as well as myself. I think I can safely promise that no act of mine shall bring reproach on the people of Madison county.
