It will be governor Gilchrist and Senator Fletcher. The combination is busted and a new deal has brought to the political surface cards which bear new faces.

With the meeting of the State Executive Committee which takes place in Jacksonville tomorrow, and the canvassing of the vote in the State and announcement of the result as officially found, the campaign of 1908 will pass into history. And there let it rest, never to be resurrected, and its like never to happen again in Florida.

The official count will have to be made by the State committee before it can be positively determined who is to be the Railroad Commissioner—Dunn or Jackson. This is a race of great interest to Madison county as Mr. Dunn lived here for many years and was at one time editor and owner of the Madison Recorder. Naturally his friends here, and they are many, hope that he has won out and that when the official canvass is made it will be found that he has a good safe majority.

One of the surprising results of that altogether surprising primary election was the inglorious defeat of Bob McNamee as Senator from Hillsboro county. Bob has been the doughty champion of the liquor forces in the State in the local option elections in several of the counties, and Hillsboro is supposed to be the strongest of the liquor strongholds. Now, while you are figuring out the problems of the election just figure out for us how it came about that McNamee was defeated.

We begin to see the finish of the Primary system of nominations in Florida. When a defeated candidate deliberately charges his fellow democrats with fraud and irregularity whereby his defeat was brought about, then, in all conscience, it is time for something to happen. We must confess we had rather witness the political death and burial of the defeated candidate than believe that our fellow democrats would resort to fraud to accomplish the defeat of any candidate before a primary.

On the face of the returns Mr. Mays is elected Congressman in this, the Third, Congressional district. His majority is small, something like 60 votes. Mr. Kehoe is not satisfied and has given notice of a contest to be heard by the Congressional committee when it meets in Tallahassee to-day to canvass the vote and declare the result. In Madison county he charges fraud in several precincts. We believe no fraud has been committed. We acknowledge a few slight irregularities such as permitting unregistered voters to cast their ballot—probably a dozen in the entire county. And it is upon such as this that Mr. Kehoe bases his contest. Like the proverbial drowning man Mr. Kehoe is grasping at every possible straw to save himself, caring nothing for the party of which he claims to be a member and having no hesitancy in branding his fellow democrats as dishonest and corrupt. Right here and now we venture to assert that should Mr. Kehoe succeed in upsetting the will of the people and have himself declared the nominee for Congress, he will find it a dearly won and empty honor. We believe the democrats of the Third District will resent the imputations cast upon them and Mr. Kehoe will live to regret his present action.

We venture to assert that in scarcely a single precinct in the entire State of Florida was there lacking some trifling irregularity in the conduct of the recent primary. It is almost impossible to conduct a primary election according to the strict letter of the law. While we admit that the law should be followed to the letter we also know that mankind is prone to error, and so long as no gross fraud is perpetrated the will of the people as expressed at the polls should not be set aside.

Next Sunday morning will occur an eclipse of the sun which will be plainly visible here. The eclipse will begin at 8:30 o'clock in the morning and can be nicely observed with the aid of a piece of smoked glass. Such an eclipse has not been visible in this part of the world for many years and another will not occur until 1915, so you'd better make the most of this.

William H. Taft and James Sherman are the nominees of the Republican party for President and Vice-President respectively. Now let the democrats give us Bryan and somebody else—don't make much difference who the somebody else may be—and we'll proceed to try to put a kink in the tail of the g. o. p. elephant.

Brother Hare of the Arcadia News gives to his readers this excellent advice which we adopt for the benefit of our own readers: "Let all the bitter things written and said during the political campaign be forgotten or relegated to the past. There is no use to speculate on the causes, or what might have been. Accept the results. Vote in Second Primary Canvass.

The County Democratic Executive Committee met in the court house last Saturday for the purpose of officially canvassing the vote of the second primary and to declare the result of the primary election. Chairman Leslie presided and Secretary W. B. Davis was on hand to attend to the detail work of the meeting. Attorney Randall H. Rowe appeared before the committee in behalf of J. Walter Kehoe, candidate for Congress, and entered a protest against the vote in precincts 3 and 5 the grounds of said protest being alleged irregularities in the conduct of the primary at these precincts. The protest was noted and the committee decided that it had no authority beyond that of noting any irregularities which might appear and reporting same to the Congressional Committee when it meets in Tallahassee to-day. The only irregularities noted were the names of several electors in these precincts appearing on the poll lists as having been "sworn in" by the managers and permitted to vote. The canvass then proceeded with the following result:
