The Board of County Commissioners met this day with all members present. Board was called to order by the chairman and reading of minutes was dispensed with.

Petition to have Peter Irvine put on pauper list on motion not granted. Upon motion \$20.00 was appropriated to M. H. Hurst for temporary relief.

It was ordered that upon being notified that the new steel bridge near Ellaville across the Withlacoochee river has been completed and accepted by the board that the clerk draw a warrant in favor of the contractor, Converse Bridge Co. for one half the cost of said bridge, payable Jan. 1st, 1909.

Charles E. Davis, county attorney, turned over to the board check for \$50.00 from Edwin Brobston on account of work done by grading machine.

Commissioner Bishop reported that he had contracted with Converse Bridge Company to put in three spans of steel bridges 21 feet each near Greenville for the sum of \$360, to be paid for August 1st, 1909, without interest, and presented contract for said work duly signed by said company and the board by its chairman.

The following communication was received from the Cemetery Improvement Association and read; upon motion same was referred to the street committee.

To the Honorable Town Council of Madison, Florida.

We the undersigned Committee appointed by the authority of the Cemetery Improvement Association of Madison, Florida, would respectfully petition your Honorable body to condemn the old plank fence situated on the east side of the lot in the Town of Madison and known as the Eppes lot, and would respectfully call the attention of this Council to the fact that the fence is rotten and very unsightly besides being so far on the side walk on the east side leading to the cemetery that it is almost impossible for persons going on same to pass when meeting. It is the purpose of the Cemetery Association to build a nice iron fence on the east side of the Cemetery Lot and to make other much needed improvements at the cemetery, a place that should be dear to every heart in the town, and the ladies of the association feel that if this Honorable Council will require the property owner of this lot to remove this fence about three feet further west that it would then be in line with the new iron fence and thus add greatly to appearance of the new fence and give ample room for a side walk and at the same time in doing this, we would be getting rid of an eye sore to the town and especially to the people who frequently visit the cemetery.
