## SOLDIERS ARE COMING HOME

Will Arrive in Gainesville This Afternoon or Tomorrow.

## SPEND A DAY IN WASHINGTON

The Boys Have Seen Some Warfare That Resembled the Real Thing.

The soldiers who went to Manassas are now homebound. They fought the great battle to a finish, and saw some warfare that resembled the real thing, and while they stood and marched and fought like real good soldiers, they have become footsore, and doubtless many of them will not want to go to war again soon.

Yesterday the boys spent the day in Washington, and as many of the Southern boys had never seen the national capital before of course they enjoyed the opportunity to the fullest extent.

Some of the Gainesville Guards writing to friends in this city give thrilling accounts of some of the hardships endured by the soldiers while at Manassas. They suffered for water, and the marching and fighting was rather more than some of them enjoyed. They speak in the highest terms of Captain Layton and the other officers, who did all they could to make the occasion war-like, but as pleasant as the circumstances would permit.

The Guards are expected to arrive in Gainesville this afternoon or tomorrow, and they should receive a royal welcome by the citizens of the town.

## FENNEL'S FOX DEAD.

Twice Captured Alive—Finally Killed by Dogs.

Sheriff Fennell, who delights to chase foxes, went out one day last week and killed a large wild cat and captured alive a grown fox. The fox was brought to Gainesville and the sheriff announced that he would take the "varmint" out about a mile from town Saturday morning at 5 o'clock, turn him loose and let his bounds run him. A large number of town people went out to witness the chase. After running about 4 or 5 miles the fox took refuge in a gopher hole, and was captured alive the second time.

He was turned loose again yesterday morning and soon took to a tree, where the hounds caught and killed him, and then the sport with the fleet animal of the forest was ended.

## Death of a Little Girl.

Little Miss Silvestra Taylor, died at the home of her parents in this city Sunday night at 8 o'clock, after an illness of only three days with meningitis.

The funeral services were held at the Taylor residence yesterday at 3 p. m. Rev. T. P. Hay officiating as minister and Dr. T. F. Thomas as funeral director. The interment was in Evergreen cemetery.

The grief-stricken parents and other relatives have the sympathy of the entire community.

## Lost by Fire.

Robt. C. Ewins, of Evinston, had the misfortune to lose his barn, lot, two mules and harness, vehicles, etc., by fire Saturday evening about sun down.

Mr. Ewins was at McIntosh on business at the time, and as the fire was discovered just after an employe had finished feeding the stock it is probable that the fire originated from a pipe or cigar used by the man.

## Attempt to Murder.

Charlie Martin, colored, was yesterday bound over in the sum of \$500, by Justice Stringfellow, at Hawthorn, for assault with intent to commit murder, and being unable to give bond he was brought to this city and put in jail.

The crime with which Martin is charged is the shooting, attempting to kill, and wounding of one David Smith.

## NOTICE OF INCORPORATION.

Notice is hereby given that we the undersigned intend to apply to the Governor of the State of Florida for Letters Patent to be issued to the Gainesville Furniture Company, a proposed corporation under the laws of the State of Florida, of which company the following shall be the Articles of Incorporation. This notice is given pursuant to the requirements of the State of Florida, and the Articles of Incorporation have been filed with the Secretary of State, and are given below.

W. R. Thomas, J. B. Padgett, C. C. Powell, J. A. Maulsby, D. D. Powell, Robt. McClellan.

## ARTICLE I.

The name of the corporation shall be "Gainesville Furniture Company," and its principal place of business shall be in Gainesville, Alachua county, Florida, but it may establish offices and agencies at other places within the State of Florida, or elsewhere.

## ARTICLE II.

The general nature of the business to be transacted by the corporation is to deal in, buy, sell and manufacture furniture, hardware and general house-furnishing goods and other articles, to conduct and carry on a general merchandise business, and an undertaking establishment, buy, sell, lease and mortgage lands, contract and build houses, and other structures, and this corporation shall have power generally to do and perform, have, hold, acquire and enjoy all other property, powers and things, as shall be incident, necessary or expedient for the conducting the necessary operation of the business, and generally to be vested with and have all the powers granted, or which may be hereinafter granted to corporations for profit, under the Laws of the State of Florida.

## ARTICLE III.

The amount of the capital stock of said company shall be Fifty Thousand Dollars, divided into five hundred shares, each of the par value of One Hundred Dollars, and shall be paid in as follows: Eight thousand dollars in cash; the balance to remain in the treasury to be disposed of in such manner as the directors may designate.

## ARTICLE IV.

The term for which this corporation is to exist is ninety-nine years.

## ARTICLE V.

The business of this corporation shall be conducted by a President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer, Board of Directors, and such other officers or agents as may from time to time be elected or appointed, that the office of Secretary and Treasurer may be held by the same person.

A Board of Directors to the number of five shall be elected by the stockholders at the meeting to be held on the first Monday in January, 1905, and annually thereafter, or they may be elected at any adjourned annual meeting. The Board of Directors shall elect the officers of the company, the President and Vice-President shall be elected from among the Board of Directors, until the first election, and until their successors shall be qualified; the following officers and directors shall conduct the business of the company: W.
