For the benefit of our readers who have
not the advantage of daily paper, we have
decided to give them the latest "war"
news, up to the day of going to press.
The BANNER always endeavors, to the
extent of its means, to cater to the wants
of the people. When there is important
news to be had, it does not hesitate at ex-
pense, to get it; and the efforts of the
BANNER to print a live, readable paper,
one appreciated, is evidenced by its rap-
idly growing subscription list.
Below will be found the telegrams re-
ceived by us, and you can judge the im-
portance by their contents:
April 10.—(Special.)—Lee reached Key
West last night. Havana to be block-
aded this week unless Spain yields. Spain
considering armistice, but administra-
tion does not consider proposition satis-
factory.
April 11.—(Special.)—President McKin-
ley's message on the Cuban situation was
sent to Congress today. It asks congress
to authorize the President to take mea-
sures to secure a termination of hostilities
in Cuba, and to secure the establishment
of a stable government there, and to use
the military and naval forces of the United
States as may be necessary for those
purposes. The President says that the
only hope of relief from a condition that
can no longer be endured, is the enforced
pacification of the island; he does not,
however, think that it would be wise or
prudent to recognize the independence of
the so-called Cuban Republic. The mes-
sage was referred to the Committee on
Foreign Affairs in each house.
April 12.—(Special.)—Senate and House
committees will present strong resolu-
tions tomorrow favoring intervention and
independence of Cuba. Senate resolutions
are essentially the Foraker resolution.
The Maine is made the subject of strong
proembrace. Sixty thousand people wel-
come Gen. Lee in Washington; solid pho-
tograph of police necessary to make way for
them.
THE RESOLUTIONS.
FIRST.—That the people of the island of
Cuba are, and of right ought to be free
and independent.
SECOND.—That the war Spain is waging
against Cuba, so destructive to the com-
mercial property interests of the United
States and so barbarous and inhuman in
its character, makes it the duty of the
United States to demand, and the govern-
ment of the United States hereby does
demand, that she at once withdraw her
land and naval forces from Cuba and
Cuban waters.
THIRD.—That the president of the United
States be and he hereby is, authorized,
empowered and directed to use, if neces-
sary, the entire land and naval forces of
the United States to carry these resolu-
tions into effect.
April 13.—(Special.)—Immediate inter-
vention and independence agreed upon;
committees in both houses, in this respect

OF INTEREST TO TEACHERS.

County Supt. Loekey has just issued a
circular letter "To Teachers," informing
them that State Supt. Sheats has located
the Summer Training School for Teach-
ers, at Chipley, and it will begin May 9.
Among other things, he says:
"Realizing that this section of our be-
loved State can never take its place in the
appreciation of the world until we become
more enthusiastic in the cause of educa-
tion, and that our schools cannot be bet-
ter than our teachers who will advance
only as they embrace every opportunity
to prepare themselves for the work, we
have arranged to have the school taught
in May and June, a time when no teacher
can plead: 'I have contracted to teach a
summer school, therefore have excused-
and."
And another thing which should not be
forgotten by the teachers, is this clause of
the letter:
"Allow us to say just here, that careles-
ness, indifference or refusal to attend this
school, without the very best cause, will
be reported promptly to patrons of Public
Schools, and to the several School Boards.
We therefore suggest that should any of
you be so circumstanced that you cannot
attend, write your County Superintendent
your reasons."
This school is not intended simply for
the teachers of Washington county alone,
but includes the teachers of Jackson and
Holmes counties, and those of Walton
county who had rather attend here than
to go to Pensacola.
Supt. Loekey has endeavored to over-
come all obstacles which would prevent
many from attending. He has been in-
formed by a committee of Chipley's citi-
zens that ample board can be had at from
\$1.50 to \$3.25 per week.
The teachers of these counties should
not fail to take advantage of this oppor-
tunity to attend a real training school.
