**CABINET EXPECT PEACE.**  
SPAIN'S ANSWER WILL PROBABLY BE MADE THIS WEEK.

Washington, Aug. 2.—The Cabinet session today, which had promised to be important in view of the pending peace propositions, proved to be uneventful. It occupied an hour and ten minutes and was devoted largely to talking over minor war details.

The informal exchange of views of individual members during the meeting indicated a strong belief in peace, though no word of any kind had yet come from the Spanish government.

One member of the Cabinet said after the meeting that he expected the Spanish reply would be made to this Government some day this week, but that when peace could be made operative is problematical.

**AMERICA'S TERMS.**  
The following is the official statement given out by authority of the President at the State Department as to the terms of peace offered by the United States:

In order to remove any misapprehension in regard to the negotiations as to peace between the United States and Spain, it is deemed proper to say that the terms offered by the United States to Spain in the note handed to the French Ambassador on Saturday last are, in substance, as follows:

The President does not now put forward any claim for pecuniary indemnity, but requires the relinquishment of all claim of sovereignty over the Island of Cuba as well as the immediate evacuation of Spain of the Island; the cession to the United States and immediate evacuation of Porto Rico and other islands under Spanish sovereignty in the West Indies, and the like cession of an island in the Ladronez. The United States will occupy and hold the city, bay and harbor of Manila, pending the conclusion of a treaty of peace which shall determine the control, disposition and government of the Philippines. If these terms are accepted by Spain in their entirety, it is stated that the commissioners will be named by the United States to meet commissioners on the part of Spain for the purpose of concluding a treaty of peace on the basis above indicated.

We have no smallpox or other contagious disease in this county. The sanitary condition of the county is good."

**COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS.**  
July 5, 1898.—City Council met at 8 p. m. Present: R. C. Horne chairman, J. B. Baxley, T. D. White and T. E. Langston. Minutes of last regular meeting read and approved. Moved and seconded that R. C. Horne examine the Clerk's books and report at the next meeting. It was ordered that the town of Chipley pay Mr. Payne's account as rendered; amount \$2. It was also ordered that R. C. Horne's account be paid. Motion that Mrs. S. Collier's property be reduced from \$800, as assessed now, to \$600. It was ordered that the Marshal's accounts be paid for the months of March, April, May and June, amounting to \$118.24.

**THE STORM.**  
Wednesday morning at about 3 o'clock one of the worst wind storms we have ever experienced struck our town. It blew from the northeast until about 8 o'clock, when it veered to the south; then to the southwest. Nearly all fencing in town was leveled to the ground, numerous shade trees and other timber was uprooted, and several buildings were blown down. But the most serious damage done was to the large, new two-story livery stable of Mr. C. G. Allen. The wind first careened the building west, then when the wind shifted it was turned back and blown to the ground; it will be a total loss; he also lost two new buggies and two hacks. **COMMUNICATED.**  
FROM A SOLDIER-BOY.  
Fernandina, Fla., Aug. 1, 1898.

EDITOR BANNER,  
Dear Sir:—I suppose some of your readers would like to hear from the boys who left Chipley with the intention of going to the war, and who are sadly disappointed at not having gone yet, and thinking we will not get to go; more, we are getting weary of eating hard tack, soldier beans, sleeping in the sand, and meeting people on the street and not being spoken to by any of them. But this is an actual fact, or at least has been.

Before we left Tampa we were not recognized as being people of the white race. 'Tis true we were very dark but some of us wasn't born that way of the United States, for the respectable people would not notice us. And still we deserved punishment of this kind from them, for a lady couldn't go on the streets without being insulted by some soldier. I don't mean to say we all deserve this punishment, but they had to treat all alike in order to get the right ones.

We find the people here very different to those at Tampa. They treat us very well indeed and seem to do everything possible to make it pleasant for us. We are camped between the town and the beach. Our bathing facilities can't be excelled at any place, and every morning between five and six o'clock there is from 500 to 600 of Uncle Sam's boys bathing in the old ocean.

We got orders Monday to be ready to board transports, Thursday, for Porto Rico; a good many of us didn't think we would go, but Crazy Ripley, (known in Chipley as Prof. J. M. Ripley) said he believed we would go so worth; so yesterday I thanked him for the full amount. It grieved him very much; you can imagine how bad a man hates to lose five dollars who is too stingy to wear under clothes and socks when they are given to him.

We have two new members from Chipley; this makes twenty-three in all, who have proved to be far above the average soldier in conduct, drilling, and in several other ways that I could mention.

Very near all the Chipley boys were expressing their regret the other day when we read the news that Mr. Horne was not nominated for Treasurer, and all say if he is not yet elected, Washington county will lose a most efficient officer.

We have only had one real sad occurrence in our company, and that was the death of private Stokes, who was not nominated for Treasurer, and all say if he is not yet elected, Washington county will lose a most efficient officer.

Dear Sir:—In the BANNER of July 30th, you unwittingly do injustice to a majority of the Republicans who attended the mass meeting at Vernon on July 23.

WHEREAS, The Legislature of 1897, under the Constitution of 1885, of the State of Florida, did pass Three Joint Resolutions proposing Amendments to the Constitution of the State of Florida, and the same were agreed to by a vote of three-fifths of all the Members elected to each House; that the vote on said Joint Resolutions were entered upon their respective Journals, with the yeas and nays thereon, and they did determine and direct that the said Joint Resolutions be submitted to the Electors of the State at the General Election in November, 1898; Now, Therefore, I, John L. Crawford, Secretary of State of the State of Florida, do hereby give notice that a

**GENERAL ELECTION**  
will be held in each county in Florida, on Tuesday next succeeding the first Monday in November, A. D. 1898, the said Tuesday being the

**EIGHTH DAY OF NOVEMBER,**  
for the Ratification or Rejection of the said Joint Resolutions proposing Amendments to the Constitution of the State of Florida, as follows, viz:

**ARTICLE XII.**  
Section 13, of Article XVI, shall be and is amended so as to read as follows:

Section 13. The sheriffs upon the official bonds of all State, county and municipal officers shall be residents of, and have sufficient visible property unencumbered within the State, not exempt from sale under legal process, to make good their bonds; and the sheriffs upon the official bonds of all county and municipal officers shall reside within the county where their principals upon such bonds reside, and shall have sufficient visible and unencumbered property in such county, that is not exempt from sale under legal process to make good their liability on such bonds. Provided, That any duly organized and responsible Guarantee or Surety Company, either foreign or domestic, lawfully doing business in this State, may become and be accepted as surety on all such official bonds."

**ARTICLE XIII.**  
Section 25, of Article VI, of the Constitution of the State of Florida is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Section 25. No courts other than herein specified shall be established in this State, except that the Legislature may clothe any Railroad Commission with Judicial Powers in all matters connected with the functions of their office.

**ARTICLE XIV.**  
Add the following as Section 34, of Article III:

Section 34. Immediately upon the impeachment of any Officer by the House of Representatives, he shall be disqualified from performing any of the duties of his office until acquitted by the Senate, and the Governor, in such case, shall at once appoint an incumbent to fill such office, pending the impeachment proceedings. In case of the impeachment of the Governor, the President of the Senate, or in case of the death, resignation or inability of the President of the Senate, the Speaker of the House of Representatives, shall act as Governor pending the impeachment proceedings against the Governor.

The votes cast in compliance with said proposed amendments and the canvass, declaration and returns thereof, shall be subjected to the same regulations and restrictions as are provided by law for general elections in the State of Florida.

The attention of the Sheriff is called to the law requiring him to cause a Notice of said Election to be published in a Newspaper printed in the county, if there be a paper published in the county, he shall cause at least five copies of this Notice to be posted in the most public places in the county.
