The Ohio legislature passed a bill for a half mill State tax levy which is expected to raise \$3,000,000 for good roads.

Investigation of alleged extravagance in the government departments was endorsed by the House committee on rules.

The Florida Good Roads Association unanimously indorsed the Angle plan of bonding the State for \$10,000,000 for good roads, and also demanded that the convicts be placed on the roads.

The reunion of the Confederate Veterans will be held this year at Little Rock, Ark., on May 16, 17 and 18. The citizens of that city will, no doubt, give the old soldiers a hearty welcome and do everything possible for their comfort and pleasure.

Congressman Hardwick of Georgia, introduced a bill one day last week to repeal the fourteenth and fifteenth amendments to the constitution, which gives the right of suffrage to the negro.

The reports of road building in the United States shows that the South is leading in this great work. Last year Texas spent seven million dollars on highways and is planning to double this amount during 1911. Georgia spent three million dollars, Virginia and North Carolina each spent a million, and other Southern states large amounts.

The Forest (Miss.) Register, in speaking of good road building, and conditions there are as they are here, says: "To spend \$60,000, or \$400 per mile on 150 miles of good roads in Scott county in the next four years will cost each tax payer approximately 50 cents per year, or \$2 for four years—the best investment of your life.
