POLITICS AND MUD.

It is a matter of regret among democrats of the state that the Sheats-Holloway case at Gainesville could not have been settled before the election. But factional feeling ran so high in that city, where both these men live, that the PROSECUTING ATTORNEYS as well as the ATTORNEYS FOR THE DEFENSE united in asking for a continuance.

What is the case? Simply this. W. N. Sheats and W. M. Holloway were both candidates before the primaries for the nomination for State Superintendent of Public Instruction. The latter won by several thousand majority. Sheats charged that his defeat was compassed by a CAMPAIGN LIE uttered and published by his successful rival, and he had Holloway arrested for criminal libel.

Campaign lies! They are not in the category of white lies. They are the meanest kind of lies. They are lies intended to injure another. But they are the stock in trade of many candidates. Uttered in the heat of a campaign their effect is not lasting. The evil that they do does not live after them. The good is oft interred in the political grave of candidates. The personally clean candidate may suffer temporary defeat through their use, but after the campaign he comes up smiling and sheds those campaign lies as water runs from the back of a duck.

Why, bless your innocent heart, the very air you breathed all through the months of struggle which led up to and culminated in the May and June primaries was charged and surcharged with campaign lies until you could dig into its blackness and cut out falsehoods with a cheese knife. Wasn't Bob Davis, as true and clean a democrat as the semi-tropical sun of Florida ever shown upon, lied about and bedaubed with campaign mud until he was veritably smothered in the slime of calumny? And didn't the same official organization of political things that slugged Holloway, and ran its silk gossamer stiletto into Sheats, and is now trying to fit lambskin clothing over the cadaver of the Wolfe, didn't it do its dirtiest with Davis?

Did the campaign lies and the committee's theft of the gubernatorial nomination injure the standing of Bob Davis? Does anyone in the state think the less of him for the perfectly sane and smiling complaisance with which he threw up his hands at the order of the banditti?

Too bad Sheats couldn't get a pointer from the action of Davis, provided he has been lied about, which Holloway denies.

In the sweet spring time when the Jay birdies nest again and the frazzle of care bedecks the countenance of the incoming administration at Tallahassee, this case MAY BE resumed in the courts. In the meantime democrats can walk to the polls, November 8th, and vote for Holloway with the full assurance that he is the same Mr. Holloway whom they selected for State Superintendent in the May primaries.

"The full power of the party is vested in the executive committee, and it is for them to see that its affairs are properly conducted. If a candidate uses unclean methods in the campaign, then it is the duty of the committee to ask its resignation. This rule applies whether the candidates are nominated in convention or by the primary."—J. Emmett Wolfe in Florida Sun.

If Jemmet Wolfe is right in the position above quoted, then the state executive committee has been woefully derelict in duty. It should long ago have constituted itself the moral clearing house of Florida's democracy, the appellate court of the democratic primary, and made other changes on the state ticket. At the same time, now that the committee has taken upon itself this self-imposed task of self-guarding the political morals of democrats, there is a suspicion that the committee should have been more careful in the selection of a substitute. To knock a primary candidate who was the choice of a big majority of democrats, simply because he was CHARGED with libel, and recommended as his substitute A SELF-CONFESSED LIABLER, is evidence, at least, of political and moral rottenness in the committee. A Hercules is needed to turn an Alpheus into the clearing house.

Hon. N. B. Broward Tonight. Napoleon B. Broward, democratic candidate for Governor of Florida, will address the citizens of Palatka at the court house tonight. The meeting will be called to order at 7:30.

The distinguished candidate is quite well known in the city, having in former years commanded a river boat which plied between here and Jacksonville. As a statesman he will make his first appearance tonight.

His address is expected to prove of unusual interest to Palatkans, and democrats generally are expressing the hope that he may be accorded a rousing reception and greeted with an audience completely filling the hall.
