Official Proceedings of County Commissioners February 9th, 1910.

The Board met with the following members present: L. C. Stephens, chairman, B. T. Solana, M. Bohannon, T. J. Rogers, W. C. Alvers, Henry Hutchinson, Clerk.

Mr. E. Hercules appeared before the board in reference to specifications for furnishing the new Court House. He suggested a committee from the board of county commissioners to confer with some of the court house officials, to find out their needs, that he would gladly meet this committee, either in Jacksonville or here, and would aid them in making a proper selection.

S. F. King presented a petition for a public road in election district No. 16, with 50 signatures from tax-payers of that section. Petition referred to Commissioner Rogers, to report at the next meeting.

On motion of Commissioner Solana, seconded by Commissioner Rogers, D. A. Pelling and his wife Sallie A. Pelling were placed on the pension roll at \$2.50 each.

On motion of Commissioner Rogers, seconded by Commissioner Bohannon, Sam Jefferson was placed on the roll at \$3.00 per month, and warrant ordered for him in the name of G. E. Gillett.

On motion of T. J. Rogers, seconded by W. C. Alvers, J. H. Houghton's offer to fill prescriptions from the jail at 25 cents each, was accepted.

Commissioner Rogers made a statement as to the condition of pauper, Porter, his extreme helplessness, etc. He said that he had authorized Mr. O'Haver to look out for said Porter until this meeting of the board.

Mr. Rogers and Mr. Bohannon were requested to make arrangements for Mr. Porter's care.

On motion of W. C. Alvers, seconded by M. Bohannon, that certain changes and conditions presented by Mr. C. D. Smith in Court House specifications, finish, etc. are accepted and approved as follows:

1. Leave out prison steel grating in door and windows and put in one extra door 3 x 7, to basement, with one flight of plain substantial steps to basement, also put in one extra transom in partition in sheriff's office.
2. Leave out all glossed tile wainscoting and 7 of the wooden mantels, substituting therefor, Bedford lime stone mantels and wainscoting. Per details furnished by architect.
3. One 10 in. marble wainscoting base instead of Bedford lime stone, per request of Mr. L. C. Stephens, Chairman of Board County Commissioners.

On motion B. T. Solana, seconded by T. J. Rogers, the proposition of E. Ben Cater, Supt. M. of W. for the Fla. East Coast R. R., was accepted, and papers and map ordered filed.

On motion, board took a recess until 2 o'clock p. m.

The board met as per adjournment at 2 o'clock p. m. with all members present.

On motion of Mr. Solana, seconded by Mr. Rogers, the bond of W. T. Knowles as bridge tender, was approved, and ordered filed.

On motion of Mr. Solana, seconded by Mr. Bohannon, a committee was appointed to make arrangements for a ferry to be run across the St. Johns River at Palatka, until Feb. 22nd, 1910.

The bill of E. N. McNabb, for the ferry deficit was refused.

Mr. W. T. Johnson of Grandin then appeared in reference to change in public road from Grandin to Florahome; the matter was referred to Commissioner Bohannon for investigation, and he to report at the next meeting.

The following estimates and payments of Bond Trustees were approved:

The board then proceeded with the work of approving bills. The following bills as notaries public, were approved:

BRIDGE OPENING CELEBRATION

Next Friday Will Be a Monster Affair—Prominent Speakers.

Barbecue, Band, and Buster Auto Parade.

The bridge opening celebration in Palatka next Tuesday, the 22d inst., when the great traffic bridge spanning the St. Johns river at this place will be formally opened to the public, promises to attract a monster crowd of people.

The Palatka board of trade has made arrangements looking to the comfort and care of the crowd and their proper feeding at a great barbecue.

And for their entertainment by a magnificent free band concert, great parade of automobiles, speeches by eminent men, and a grand balloon ascension.

The program for the day will open at 10 a. m. with the band concert on the corner of Second and Lemon street.

At 11 a. m. the great procession of automobiles will start from these streets, over the big bridge, headed by the band. In the autos immediately following the band will be the speakers, accompanied by President Geo. B. Seiden, Mayor Davis, J. N. Walton, and Col. H. M. de Montmolli. Following will be other distinguished guests and visitors in automobiles, of which vehicles it is predicted there will be from 75 to 100.

Prominently at 12 noon Hon. Geo. B. Seiden, president of the Palatka board of trade, will deliver the address of welcome, after which, from 12:15 to 1:15 p. m. the crowd is expected to keep busy with the big barbecued dinner on the big vacant lot.

Following the dinner will be addresses by Hon. James T. Willis, circuit judge, Governor R. B. Broward, Senator James P. Talbot, the matchless "Bob" Davis, and Hon. S. J. Hilburn.

The big balloon ascension will take place at 3 p. m. on the vacant lot back of the Presbyterian church.

The board of trade has made request of all merchants to close their places of business between the hours of 11 a. m. and 2 p. m., so that all may attend the barbecue and principal exercises.

Excursions Coming.

River excursions will run to Palatka from Crescent City, San Mateo, Georgetown, Welaka, Picoletta, Federal Point, and other landings.

Capt. W. M. Miller of Crescent City will bring a big excursion from St. Johns Park and Crescent City, and the steamer Harry Lee will bring a crowd from Welaka and other up-river points, returning late the same day.

Palatka people extend a cordial welcome to all to come and partake of this big barbecue dinner.

By B. T. Solana, the offer of Dr. A. M. Rogers, accepted, he to furnish services and medicine for one year at \$50.00 per annum.

The bond of E. R. Conway, with E. S. Crill and R. C. Howell as sureties, was then approved.

On motion of Solana, seconded by Rogers, Chairman Stephens was appointed as a delegate to represent the board of county commissioners of Putnam county at the convention of county commissioners to be held in Tampa on February 24th inst.

There having been complaint made that lumber carts and turpentine wagons were cutting up the public road from Georgetown to the Volusia county line, that the persons using said carts and wagons be notified to repair said roads according to law. The clerk was authorized to notify said persons.

The board then took a recess until 9 o'clock a. m.

The board met as per adjournment at 9 o'clock a. m. Feb. 10th, with all members present.

The pistol bond of Cecil Coon, with Geo. E. Gay and John Mallem as sureties, was approved, also bond of Arthur C. Hay, with J. L. Burt and W. H. Hinton, as sureties.

SEVEN KILLED IN RAILROAD WRECK

Caused by Head-on Collision on G. S. & F. Ry. Last Monday.

Several of Victims Known in Palatka.

Five persons were instantly killed and two of the injured have since died as a result of a head-on collision on the G. S. & F. railway nineteen miles south of Macon, Ga., last Monday afternoon, between Welleston and Bonaire.

The dead are:
W. J. Yates, engineer on train No. 5.
A. R. Johnson, baggage man.
Conductor I. B. Ingalls, traveling as a passenger.
Conductor Dupre, traveling as a passenger.
One unknown white man.
Jas. Stephens, colored, fireman train No. 2.
J. F. Blount, traveling salesman from Orangeburg, S. C.

There were a number of others seriously injured.

It is stated that the accident was caused by the crew of train No. 5 mistaking orders to meet train No. 5 at Bonaire.

A wrecking train and a relief train were sent out from Macon as soon as the news of the disaster reached the head office of the road. The relief train reached Macon at 11 o'clock bearing the bodies of the dead and injured.

Both engines, the mail and baggage car, and two day coaches were the wreckage demolished. The trains were not running at a great rate of speed, but they met on a curve and the engineers had little chance to prevent the accident.

The wreck occurred in a dismal wail and the passengers describe the cries of the wounded and dying as most pitiful and heartrending. Several hours elapsed before medical aid reached the scene. Many women passengers bound the wounds of the injured with bandages torn from their clothing.

The body of Engineer Yates was buried beneath his engine, and it required several hours to remove the debris so that his body could be extricated.

Several of the dead railroad men are well known in Palatka.

Mr. Wall a Candidate.

Hon. John P. Wall of Putnam Hall has his announcement in this paper as a candidate for State Senator, an announcement which the News had already predicted, and which, therefore, will cause no surprise in the county.

Mr. Wall served the county through several sessions of the legislature as a member of the House of Representatives, and is well known to the people of the county to need no further introduction. He has long had an ambition to go to the Senate, and four years ago was an unsuccessful candidate against Dr. Crill. The known determination of the latter not to seek reelection has led to his influence in determining Mr. Wall to again make the race.

His opponent will be Hon. S. J. Hilburn of this city, a leader at the Florida bar, and himself one of the most astute campaigners in the state.

Mr. Edmonson a Candidate.

J. E. Edmonson, who is now serving his first term as county treasurer, has his announcement of a desire for a second term in this edition of the News. Mr. Edmonson has made an efficient and faithful guardian of the public money of the county, and as he has grown mightily in popularity since his appearance in the primary two years ago, there is every indication that the people will give him a second term. Up to the present time the News has heard no rumor of opposition to him.

The Work of the Women.

Putnam county is now doing things in the way of internal improvement that should be followed by her sister counties.

The present activity in this line is due largely to the initiative inaugurated by the Women's Club of Palatka, who caused the old city officials to be displaced some years ago by men who were not afraid to get a move on and replace the mud-paved streets of the city with vitrified brick pavement, as well as to make other greatly needed improvements.

The change in city officials resulted in such great benefit to Palatka that at the ensuing election for county officials the old office-holders were displaced by new ones—men who said they had the nerve to do for the county what had been done for Palatka—and they are doing it.
