STATE NEWS NOTES.

A favorable report has been made by the army engineers on the entire inland waterway from St. George's Sound on the west coast of the peninsula of Florida, to the Rio Grande. The portion from Galveston to Corpus Christi, in Texas, is already in operation and the pending river and harbor bill makes provision for the sections from Corpus Christi to the Rio Grande and from Galveston to the Louisiana line.

If nothing prevents, the election to decide upon a new charter by which the city council of Jacksonville will be clothed with many powers now exercised by the bond trustees may be held on June 2 at the same time that the primaries are held in the state at large.

St. Johns county is to vote on the question of bonding for good roads on April 1. The proposition includes the building of 64 miles of brick highway 9 feet wide from the Duval to the Volusia county line and across to Putnam county. The carrying out of this project will add about 50 miles of splendid hard road to the "John Anderson Highway."

In celebration of the elaborate new club building the Clermont board of trade has arranged an interesting program to be carried out. The new club house building and grounds represent an outlay of \$25,000.

For the purpose of discussing matters in connection with the holding of the coming congressional primary in the Second district, the congressional committee of the district met at Lake City. Because of the redistricting of the state and a change of the lineup of counties in the district, a number of the old members of this committee were not in attendance, and it was decided to name the new members necessary and elect officers.

One of the most extraordinary cases recorded by the local immigration authorities was made known in Jacksonville by the arrest of Arthur Vito, the son of a wealthy German steamboat owner, on a United States warrant charging him with being an undesirable citizen, for the fact that he is a sufferer of epilepsy, and through some means had been smuggled into the country.

J. C. Privett, state labor inspector, was appointed by Governor Trammell to represent the state at the tenth annual conference of the National Child Labor committee, which convened in New Orleans, La., in a four-days' session.

For the purpose of engaging in preparations to elementary practice, a flotilla of torpedo boats now temporarily stationed at New Orleans, is expected to reach Key West to proceed immediately to Dry Tortugas. Advice to that effect were received by Capt. E. E. Hayden, U. S. N., commandant of the Key West.

WAR DEPARTMENT HAS RIGHT TO PROTECT WATERS.

Wright Upholds Government Authority in the Lake Okechobee Matter.

Jacksonville.—Col. G. N. Saussy, superintendent of the Old Soldiers' Home, has written a communication, seeking some enlightenment as to the right of the war department to control Lake Okechobee. "There must be some claim on the part of the general government," says Colonel Saussy, "else as well-informed persons as the governor of Florida would not be in Washington seeking permission to reduce the water level of this inland lake."

The communication when shown Col. J. O. Wright, former chief Everglades drainage engineer, and who is probably the best authority on the subject in the state, said: "The constitution of the United States vests with the war department the right to exercise control over the navigable streams of the country where interstate commerce is affected. As the head of the Caloosahatchee river, as well as the Kissimmee river, is in Lake Okechobee, the war department has the right to determine whether the lowering of the lake will interfere with the navigation on those streams."

"The government has given permission to lower Lake Okechobee from 29 to 16 feet, but there must be locks and dams built so that the water can be retained at certain times of the year in order to maintain navigation on the two rivers."

"The war department has the right to protect all navigable streams, and in the lake Okechobee matter is acting as it does in all cases where navigable streams affecting interstate commerce are involved."
