

ATTORNEY ADAMS GIVES GOOD REASONS

Why Sidney J. Catts is Not Entitled to the Vote of Any Democrat.

Mr. Thos. B. Adams, the Jacksonville attorney, only recently declined to debate with Hon. W. W. Flournoy the question as to who is the Democratic Nominee for Governor of Florida on the ground that the question has already been settled by many tribunals, and is therefore no longer a mooted one.

Mr. Adams also declined to discuss the question for the following reasons:

In the first place, the voters at the June primary election settled that question as evidenced by the declared majority of twenty-one votes for Mr. Knott on September 20th to which has been added for Mr. Knott five votes from your own county, Walton, three from Washington, three from Clay, thirty-five from Marion, two from Palm Beach, ten from Lee, twenty-eight from Hillsborough and sixteen from Alachua, as against sixty-nine from Dade for Mr. Catts. And in my opinion, had it not been for the strenuous and able opposition to the correction of the manifest errors in your own and other counties of the State, the choice of the electors would have been evidenced by a much larger majority in favor of Mr. Knott than is now on file with the Governor and the Secretary of State.

In the next place, the State Canvassing Board settled the proposed question on September 20th when they, in compliance with an order of the Supreme Court, declared Mr. Knott the Democratic nominee by a majority of twenty-one votes, which majority has now been increased by the votes above mentioned.

In the third place, the State Democratic Executive Committee on October 7th, in no uncertain terms, declared that Mr. Knott is the due and rightful nominee of the Democratic party for the office of Governor. I refer to the resolution adopted by that Committee by an overwhelming vote.

In the fourth place, the Supreme Court's decisions, rendered on October 6th, October 7th, October 9th and October 10th, holding that Mr. Catts, either through mistake or design, had failed to show facts whereby the declared result should be changed, are in substance a judicial determination that Mr. Knott is still the Democratic nominee for Governor, pursuant to the declaration made by the State Canvassing Board on September 20th.

In the fifth place, Mr. Catts by permitting or causing to be sent petitions in his behalf to every Board of County Commissioners in the State of Florida, and by causing or permitting the Secretary of State to certify his name to the various Boards of County Commissioners as the nominee of the Prohibition party, has himself admitted that he is not the Democratic nominee for Governor, and that Mr. Knott is the rightful and lawful holder of that title.

The question, therefore, which you propose, having been settled by these various tribunals and in sundry ways, it occurs to me that any further discussion between you and me on the subject would be idle ceremony, even though I had the opportunity and inclination for such discussion.

Since writing that letter my views have not changed with reference to the subject therein discussed. As a member of the Duval Democratic Club and as a private citizen, I deem it my further privilege to state as succinctly as possible my views on the present political situation. Not being a public speaker, I have reduced to writing what I conceive to be the most valid reason why the Reverend Sidney J. Catts is not entitled to the vote of any Democrat; these reasons being as follows:

1st, because it has been determined in the sundry and various ways pointed out in my letter to Mr. Flournoy that Mr. Catts is not the Democratic nominee for Governor.

2nd, because Mr. Catts' Alpha record shows that he is a political off-est of that state.

3rd, because the best people of Alabama, particularly leading citizens of Pleasant Hill and Selma, where Mr. Catts formerly lived, give him a bad reputation, and are of the firm conviction that if he were elected Governor of Florida he would legalize his administration with unparalleled extravagance and corruption, selling out to the highest bidder with compunction.

4. because his gross insults to our high school evel graduates, their fathers and mothers, brothers and sweethearts, show him to be a man unfit and unworthy to be Governor, or to be a member of the Board of Control of our higher institutions of learning, or to hold any other office of honor and trust.

5th, because his use of vile epithets and unparaphable language in the presence of two hundred ladies, as he did in his speech at Gainesville, shows him to be a political ruffian, and unfit to occupy the Governor's Mansion or any other position of dignity.

6th, because his unwarranted attacks upon our beloved old soldiers, who will soon go to join their comrades of the lost cause, shows that he is at heart a Republican of the same stripe as Nelson A. Miles and his associate Billy Parker.

7th, because of numerous false boasts which he has told in and down the state about the accounts, and about Mr. Knott personally, which falsehoods have from time to time been proven as him, shows that he is an unscrupulous politician, willing to employ any means to attain the desired end.

8th, because the reports from Ala-

ma to the effect that he was there a part owner in a whisky business and the persistent rumors that have been afloat in Jacksonville for months concerning the extortion of money from the whisky clubs of that city, with which to finance Mr. Catts' campaign lead me to believe not only that his prohibition declarations are insincere, but also that if he should be elected Governor the race track people and the whisky people could get any kind of protection they wanted, if they are willing to pay for it.

9th, because a man who will sow the seeds of anarchy and disrespect for the courts and constituted authorities to such an extent that his own counsel, Mr. Flournoy, is moved voluntarily, after eulogizing the Supreme Court for its fairness and impartial justice, to make the following statement before that court:

"My client has criticised this Court in the heat of passion and debate. I do not know whether he is ashamed of it or not, but I am."

Is a dangerous and unsafe man to trust with the executive affairs of this state.

10th, because Mr. Catts and his parasites have so far been unable to point out any act of his beneficial to Florida, or to assign any sane reason why he, as a Prohibitionist, Independent fore-day club candidate, or otherwise, should receive the vote of any self-respecting citizen.

On the other hand, I have endeavored in writing, in as brief space as follows, the reasons why the Honorable W. V. Knott is entitled to the vote of every Democratic elector in this State, and why he should be elected Governor:

1st, because it has been determined in the sundry and various ways pointed out in my letter to Mr. Flournoy that Mr. Knott is the nominee of the Democratic Party for the office of Governor.

2nd, because he is in no sense a hyphenated citizen, having been reared as a boy in Lake County, since which time he has been familiarly known throughout the State as "Will Knott."

3rd, because he is a Christian gentleman, having been for years a deacon in the Baptist church at Tallahassee, and trustee of the Baptist college at Lake City, and a life-long believer in religious liberty and the right of every man to worship God as he may desire.

4th, because in his many years of faithful and efficient public service as State Auditor, State Comptroller and State Treasurer, he has acquired that experience and knowledge of the State's finances and general needs which admirably equin him for the responsible duties of Governor.

5th, because being a member of the Cabinet under four different Governors, he is perhaps more familiar with every department of the State's business than any other citizen within its borders.

6th, because he has protected the State's interest in the matter of taxation and has always stood for rigid economy in governmental expenditures.

7th, because he was instrumental in procuring the passage of the law creating the County budget system whereby the County Commissioners are prevented from squandering the people's money.

8th, because he inaugurated a thorough and systematic method of auditing and checking the State's finances in all departments with which the Comptroller's office is connected, whereby tens of thousands of dollars are saved to the State annually.

9th, because as a member of the Trustees Internal Improvement Fund, he urged and procured a re-survey of a portion of the Everglades thereby saving several hundreds of thousand of acres of very valuable land to the State, which otherwise would have gone to the Railroads.

10th, because he favored liberal pensions in favor of the old veterans who, in their declining years, need more help and greater protection.

11th, because as a member of the State Board of Public Institutions, he pressed the establishment of a state prison farm, which is now proving a great asset to the State, whereby the men and women convicts are made self-sustaining and are receiving more humane treatment.

12th, because as a member of the State Board of Control, he urged the establishment of two great schools of higher education, the State University at Gainesville for men, and the Florida State College for Women at Tallahassee, and also stands for better common schools and better paid teachers.

13th, because Florida has tried him in various capacities and found him loyal and faithful to every trust reposed in him.

14th, because the Democratic party can rally to his standards with his past good work as an assurance that his tenure of office as Governor will not bring reproach upon the State, but that his administration will take rank for fair and economical handling of the affairs of State, and for constructive statesmanship along with the foremost Democratic Governors during the State's past history.

The foregoing being my personal views with reference to the personal qualifications of the two candidates and with reference to the duty of all Democratic voters, I would urge upon all Democrats to remember that "Violence is the Price of Liberty," and never before since the carpet-bag days of '75 was there so great necessity on the part of every Democrat to rally to the party's standards and to protect the good name of the party and of this fair State against the attack of their enemies.
