To Test Constitutionality of Florida Game Law

Believing the so-called Gornato game law to be unconstitutional, members of the Duval Gun Club, of Jacksonville, have laid the foundation stones for a test case before the state supreme court at an early date. This was decided at a meeting of the club held in the Professional building, and a large sum to defray the expense of employing eminent counsel to contest the law was raised. More is necessary, however, and the president is expected to name a committee to call upon the hunters and others interested in seeing certain alleged obnoxious sections stricken out to contribute a small share to the expense incident. Officials of the organization have been given to understand that the new law will not hold water in a test case if brought before the supreme court, and it is expected that an early hearing will take place in Tallahassee. It is expected that a member or some designated person will call upon the county judge for a license, and upon being refused because of not being a resident of the county for a period of six months, will seek to have the license issued in mandamus proceedings. The case will thus reach the supreme court.—Arcadia News.
