## An Everglades Defender

The editor of the esteemed Aurburndale News rushes to the defense of the Everglades interests, where those interests have not dared to defend themselves. Opening its lay sermon to this paper The News says:

It is seldom that we have read so unpleasant a personal attack as The Gainesville Sun in its issue of Nov. 2 makes on the people of the Everglades country for their appeal for relief from the mismanagement of a most incompetent Internal Improvement Board. This document is altogether of the old, very old, style of political claptrap, appealing in fervid oratory to passion and prejudice entirely and dodging issues of fact.

The Board of Trade of West Palm Beach says of the same thing we denounced:

We desire to say that we sincerely deplore the scurrilous and ungentlemanly methods adopted by certain individuals and civic organizations in our neighboring county in their frantic attempts to save themselves from conditions which their own selfishness and greed brought upon them.

Editor Hanna admits that he has never been to the Everglades and knows nothing about them. That he is accepting the word of trained civil engineers as to the practicability of the drainage scheme, when he ought to know the opinion of engineers is about as greatly at variance on great problems as the opinions of doctors about common colds.

In the paragraph above quoted he charges incompetence against the Internal Improvement Trustees—we dare say without knowing the men or what they have done, or what they have to do with. This also upon the statement of some people whom the Board of Trade in an adjoining county of the Everglades district declare have acted "ungentlemanly."

Our charge was against the unwholy schemers connected with the Everglades propositions. We know the Trustees of the Improvement Board and we know many—a great many—of the schemers who have made fortunes while dabbling in Everglades schemes; which is a pretty good indication they have made them out of said schemes.
