RUSSIANS PRESS FORWARD TOWARD THE CARPATHIANS

Driving Before Them the Defeated Austrian Army

WHICH ABANDONED CZERNOWITZ

French Repulse Three German Attacks on Hill 321, and Report Failure of a Teutonic Surprise Attack in the Vosges.

London, Eng.—For the second time the Russian armies are heard for the Carpathian mountain passes driving before them the defeated Austrian army which was compelled to abandon Czernowitz. The advance from the river Pruth continues toward the Sereth river and the passes which, if successfully cleared, will open the way for a drive into the heart of agricultural Hungary. It remains to be seen whether the heights of the Carpathians must again be the apex of Russian advance as was the case in the first great drive, which resulted, after the counter-drive of the Russians losing all the territory they had won and being driven back into their own land.

The belief here is growing that the Russian drive will not be checked, even by the reinforcement with German troops of the sadly harassed Austrians, because it is not thought the Germans will be able to spare any great mass of men from the western front or the northern sector of the eastern front.

The combined Teutonic forces have succeeded in checking the Russian advance in the region south of the Pripiet marshes to the west of Koki and along the Stokhod river. Northwest of Lutsk, where the Russians recently captured two strong fortresses, the struggle seems to be

going favorably to the Teutons. German Attacks on Hill 321 Repulsed

Three German attacks made on the French positions northwest of Hill 321 were repulsed by the fire of the French machine guns, according to an official statement issued by the French war office. The Germans are heavily bombarding the French positions in the neighborhood of Vaux, Chapitre, and Chattancourt.

The French official statement of Tuesday was to the effect that on the right bank of the river Meuse German forces delivered three attacks on their positions northwest of Hill 321 but all forces were turned on them, breaking up the attacks. The bombardment has been intense in the region of the woods of Vaux and Chapitre, and in the sector of Chattancourt on the left bank of the river.

In the Vosges a surprise attack by the enemy upon an advanced sap in the region of Michelbach south of Thann resulted in failure.
