The Bonds Win!

BY MAJORITY OF 388 VOTES THE PEOPLE DECIDE.

Successful Termination of a Campaign for Progress in Putnam County.

The interest in last Tuesday's election centered almost entirely in the \$190,000 bond proposition which was to be decided by the voters, and in the race of our fellow townsman, S. W. Rowley, for Railroad Commissioner, on the Republican ticket.

The committee which has had in hand the management of the campaign for bonding the county for public improvements, only ceased their persistent and commendable work when the polls closed Tuesday night. Their success is complete, and their reward, we confidently believe, awaits them in the good that is to come to Putnam County and to all our people from the many necessary improvements that are now possible and will speedily be made.

Of credit for the success of the bonds each favorable voter of the county and every worker in the cause is due his meed, but special note should be made of the efforts of one man in particular. Fore and foremost in the bond movement has been Geo. B. Selden, of Palatka, a man of experience and rare business ability. It was he who studied out and perfected the bonding plans, which have been passed upon and pronounced first-class by some of the best financial institutions of the country, and he has probably devoted more time to the details of the campaign than anyone else. Mr. Selden, while one of the largest taxpayers in the county, can receive no greater benefit from public improvements than any other resident. Almost the entire output of the great door and blind factory of which he is president, is sold outside of the county or state. His labor has been unselfish and for the good of all.

S. W. Rowley, for Railroad Commissioner, polled 486 votes in the county, against 561 for Dunn, the Democratic candidate.

The only contest in the county was C. I. Rowton, (Dem.) and John E. Marshall, (Rep.) for Justice of the Peace for the Eighth District, the result being a victory for Marshall by a majority of 45.

Card From Bond Committee.

The Central Campaign Committee, in the interest of the Putnam County bond improvement project, desires to say:—The election has taken place and the majority for bonds has been sufficiently large to remove any doubt as to the result. That the people at large,

and especially those who have been most active in the furtherance of the cause, will continue their interest in and for the proper carrying out of all the details, goes without saying. Promises to the people have been made, and these promises most certainly must be carried out. The Committee naturally feels great satisfaction in the pronounced endorsement accorded them, and their thanks go out to everybody.

New Teachers at Rollins.

There will be a number of changes in, and additions to, the faculty at Rollins for the coming year, all tending to strengthen and render more effective the teaching, governing, and administrative forces of the of the institution.

To the chair of Latin and Greek will come Professor B. Leigh Alexander. He is a native of Egypt, where his father is a distinguished missionary of the United Presbyterian church and president of Assiut College. Mr. Alexander's early education was conducted by tutors. He then took his college course at Westminster College, Pennsylvania, where he graduated as valedictorian in a class of forty-three members and afterward at Princeton University where he achieved honors. He was appointed Princeton representative at Oxford University as Rhodes scholar, where he specialized for three years in classics and obtained a degree.
