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**THE BLOW THAT MOST KILLED FATHER.**

Yesterday Governor Broward showed that he knew that various influences, good as well as bad, would prompt members of the Legislature to offer resolutions investigating the acts of the Trustees. Threats that resolutions like these would be introduced have been made, and before the appointment of committees to notify the Governor and House that the Senate was organized could be made, John Beard, Senator from the Second, offered his resolution to investigate.

Of course, the resolution had to be read before anybody could find out what was in it, but it was sidetracked until the committees could be named. While these committees were out, discussion on the resolution commenced. In the meanwhile the Governor sent in three messages, one of which was a special one ASKING FOR THE VERY COMMITTEE of investigation provided for in Mr. Beard's resolution.

Again was the Senate uninformed of the contents of this special message until it could be read, but so anxious was Mr. Beard to be NUMBER ONE, with these same resolutions, that his eloquence, vehemence and persistence RATTLED THE PRESIDENT OF THE SENATE, and caused him to FORGET that the Governor had sent messages to the Legislature.

While Mr. Beard was speaking the President evidently thought this a good time to glance over these special messages, and after one glance he interrupted Mr. Beard's flow of oratory to have the special messages read, giving as a reason for the interruption that the Governor had sent a message on the same subject that Mr. Beard was speaking on.

Mr. Harris apologized very prettily for his forgetfulness of the order of procedure, and explained his mental hiatus by saying that the business of the Senate came so fast upon him that he overlooked the Governor's message.

This message of the Governor, calling for an investigation MORE SWEEPING IN ITS CHARACTER than Mr. Beard's resolution, took the wind out of the sails of those who think—that because uninformed editors of newspapers have said so—there is something wrong about the Trustees.

The other special message of the Governor carried with it the State Auditor's check of all of the financial transactions of the Trustees since the beginning of the Trust, until January, 1907, which audit will, no doubt, be of material assistance to the committee which will be appointed in Mr. Beard's resolution.

**SECRETARY OF STATE**

**DOES NOT HAVE TO OBEY.**

If some body don't back down there promises to be quite an interesting case, the result of which no one can foresee, due to a motion adopted by the Senate yesterday.

After John Beard got his shame resolution through, senator Humphries arose in the seat and called attention to the resolution passed at the last session, directing the Secretary of State to vacate the rooms of the second floor of the south end of the Capitol building, so that they could be used as committee rooms by the Senate during the session of 1907.

He called attention to the fact that some of these rooms were still occupied; three by the adjutant general, and two by the Railroad Commission.

He made a motion that the Secretary of State be instructed to enforce the terms of the resolution adopted last session, vacating these rooms for use of the Senate as committee rooms.

Senator Hudson objected to the adoption of this motion because of the inconvenience it would entail upon these officers in charge of two State departments.

Senator Humphries had said in support of his motion that Senate committees would have to hold their sessions on logs, if there were any logs laying around Tallahassee; Senator Hudson said that it would be better for the Senate committees to hold their sessions on logs, than for State officers to sit in the shade of trees around the Capitol and attend to the business of the State, and important business, too.

If Secretary of State Crawford will look at one of the copies of the General Statutes, of which he has two thousand or more, he will find that Sections 77 and 78 of these General Statutes, gives him charge of the Capitol building, and places upon him the sole duty of assigning rooms to the State officers. Section 78 directs him to assign rooms in the State Capitol for the use of State officers; to provide not less than four rooms for Legislative committee rooms, two for the House and two for the Senate.

If the Secretary of State will look at the records in his office, he will find that he has provided ten committee rooms for the Legislature, so when the Sergeant-at-Arms waits on the Secretary of State today to enforce the order of the Senate, carried by Senator Humphries' motion, which was adopted yesterday, he will be told, because

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
