Because—

When the auditor of one of the three rail-
roads which own it checks up the business
office of the Times-Union he pulls the purse
strings when money is needed to pay men
capable of getting out a newspaper. So the
Times-Union doesn't have them.

For—

All the railroad owners of the Times-
Union want is a thing to do their bidding.
They see no necessity in paying for brains,
when all they want is blind obedience, which
is a much cheaper commodity.

All this is so

For this reason—

Because the Times-Union is owned by the
Atlantic Coast Line, the Florida East Coast
and the Seaboard Air Line Railway Com-
panies.

The Times-Union is NOT a newspaper—it
IS a chattel.

And the Chattel of a Republican who con-
tributed \$2,000 to elect a Republican Gover-
nor of New York.

PUBLIC MIND IS POISONED

BY THE TIMES-UNION.

The Times-Union not only prints tainted news sent free
of charge from the National Capital, but it prints false
news from the Capital of Florida, sent by a representa-
tive who is on the payroll of the State as a Legislative
committee clerk.

In the Wednesday morning issue of the corporation
bible, it stated that Senate Bill No. 13, providing that
the Trustees of the Internal Improvement Fund of the
State of Florida and other State officials shall advertise
for bids before selling the public lands of the State, was
passed unanimously.

Instead, the bill was read the second time in full,
amended and referred to the Committee on Engrossed
Bills.

In the issue of Friday morning the corporation bible
printed an editorial saying that "the bill passed unani-
mously in the Senate," and then proceeded to give other
false information.

The bill is still on third reading in the Senate.

Perhaps it was the fault of the Senate in not being able
to interpret the wishes of the corporation bible.

But the bill is still on third reading.

The Times-Union, using its false statement for a text,
then charges the Trustees with "waste of the assets of the
State."

During the campaign of last year and since, the Times-
Union has printed, almost daily, false statements concern-
ing the Governor or the administration and of the Trus-
tees of the Internal Improvement Fund.

It will not always be possible for the Times-Union to
deceive the people of Florida—

By printing "tainted news"—

By printing untruths—

By trying to sway a Legislature for corporate benefit
under the guise of "interest and welfare of Floridians."

Not because that it is likely that the Times-Union will
ever refrain from such practices—its ownership forbids—

But because some day a daily morning newspaper will
be established in Jacksonville—

That will be free from corporation or other form of con-
trolled ownership—

That will print the news as it happens, no sailing under
false colors;

That will voice its opinions without fear and without
favor;

That will be a newspaper and not a chattel.

Then will the people of Florida be freed from the printed
poison of the Times-Union.
