FLORIDA EXPECTS EVERY SENATOR TO DO HIS DUTY—MONDAY IS THE DAY.

On behalf of Senator Trammell, I speak to the Senate of the State of Florida, and respectfully urge the Senators who compose that body to pass Senate Bill No. 124, introduced by Senator Trammell, which comes up as special order Monday at 3:30.

It is known as the State Life Insurance bill, and its passage would put Florida ahead of all of the States in this Union, making it lead the van that is bound to line up sooner or later (and I believe very soon) on this question.

It is a great question, and the principle is as pure and worthy as that of the franchise tax principle.

The reason why I speak to the Senate in behalf of Senator Trammell is that he should be accorded the honor, by permission of the Senate, to put this law on the statute books, on account of the manner in which the Senate treated him in regard to the franchise tax principle.

He made the fight for that proposition, and it was his exposition of it that created the sentiment for it, which did not become strong enough to pass a proper bill, but nevertheless proved to be strong enough to save the principle.

Senator Trammell plowed the ground and sowed the seed for the propagation and cultivation of the tree that bore the fruit known as the railroad license tax law, but he was not accorded the privilege of gathering it.

He now comes forward with another proposition of equal merit, which the State of Florida will be obliged to accept at an early period in its history, and Senators have an opportunity to reward a faithful public servant by getting behind this bill and passing it so that his efforts towards general, proper and remedial legislation may be recognized and made patent to his fellow citizens.

State life insurance is in force in every country in Europe, and the reason why it is not in force in the United States today is that trusts and combinations of capital are unknown in Europe and they are known in this country—so well known, in fact, that they dominate and control the party that rules the country.

The enormous aggregation of money in the hands of a few men who conduct the life insurance companies of this country, have made it possible for trusts and combinations to exist.

Without the use of this money it would have been impossible to have created most of the large trusts and combinations which today are more powerful than the Government.

This in itself would be reason sufficient for the establishment of a system of State life insurance, but that is not the only danger.

The astounding abuses practiced by the few men who control the life insurance companies made plain by the Armstrong investigation, would have been sufficient to have wiped the insurance companies out of existence, if it were not for the fact that hundreds of thousands of people would have been grossly wronged.

Out of consideration for the innocent policy holders the American people did not rise in their might and drive these money-changers from the temple of the country's liberty.

Protected by the innocent victims that would have been sacrificed in their destruction, life insurance companies are still doing business at the same old stand, and in the same old way.

The only difference is that they are not so open in their malefactions.

That there can be no change in the control of these companies was conclusively demonstrated at the recent election, when the people's directors were defeated by combinations made by the old crowd.

The next best thing, in fact the only thing to do, is to put the life insurance business in the hands of the State. There is no reason why the State should not insure the lives of its citizens.

It insures their liberties, and liberties are dearer to the people than property, whether it be tangible property represented by real estate, stocks and bonds, or intangible, represented by a life insurance contract.

Under State life insurance, protection can be extended so as to reach every family living in the State.
