Death of Rev. Beckman.

The Rev. J. S. Beckman died at Sea Breeze Thursday evening July 10 at 8.30 p. m. He was born near Lambertville, N. J., 1836, was a graduate of New Brunswick and Princeton Colleges, preparing for the ministry at Princeton Theological Seminary. He labored in the South until the end of the Civil War, when he went West to Kansas and Illinois, but left to go East and accept a church at Reville, N. J., later he became Chaplain at the House of Correction, Randall's Island, N. Y. On account of failing health he came to Florida, when he became Rector of St. Mary's Church, Daytona. He was one of the first settlers on the beach at Sea Breeze, when he became active in developing the natural resources, and beauties of the beach.


