FLORIDA'S DEATH RATE.

Florida's death rate, according to a recent bulletin, is 12.26 per thousand. The highest death rate, according to the same authority, is in the district of Columbia—22.68—and the lowest in North Dakota—7.17.

Statistical reports of deaths in Florida according to population, is unfair to the State as regards the general health of her people. A very great many unfortunates come to Florida from the North and East with both feet, practically, in the grave. They come to Florida to benefit, and thus the Florida death rate is increased and its percentage made larger in the tables of vital statistics. We venture the assertion that with this element kept out of the reports, Florida would show less death rate per thousand than any State in the Union.—Sanford Chronicle.


