A NEW IDEA. The habit of sending postage stamps to pay for small purchases is very general. Retail merchants, publishers and others receive so many stamps through the mails that they are put to serious inconvenience, as nobody wants stamps for change and they are not readily convertible into cash. Many merchants will not take stamps in lieu of money, but it is often inconvenient for those who send orders by mail to procure postoffice postal notes and they do not like to send coin in letters. Assistant Postmaster Hubbard has a plan that he thinks will be a great convenience to both merchants and purchasers by mail. It provides for the issue of postage stamp certificates. The customer would be allowed to buy, from the local postmaster at very small extra cost, a stamp certificate for the desired amount and send it instead of the stamps it represents. The receiver of this certificate could convert it into stamps at its par value, or into cash at a discount of only 1 per cent. This plan is approved by many Chicago merchants and has been endorsed by the newspapers of that city. It will be proposed to Congress at its next session. T. M.
