PROGRESSING SATISFACTORILY.

At the council meeting Monday evening a committee, consisting of Messrs. J. W. Wilkinson, C. M. Bingham, Jr., and Mayor Ludwig, was appointed to confer with Adam Schantz with reference to changing the contract with Mr. Schantz and the city, and have incandescent lights instead of arc.

After due consultation it was decided to let the contract stand as at present. A few persons have felt a little "sore" over cutting a few branches of trees in the way of the line.

In reference to the work Mr. Tremere stated to the GAZETTE-NEWS as follows: "Our Mr. Henry, superintendent of construction, will arrive in Daytona Sunday or Monday, with a corps of competent men to do the construction work."

COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS.

Council met in regular session Monday evening with President Bingham in the chair.

Present, Ald. Atwood, Conrad, Foster and Rix. Minutes of previous meeting read and approved.

Bill amounting to \$56.67 were presented and ordered paid.

Moved by Ald. Foster, and seconded by Ald. Conrad, that the committee appointed to repair the foundations to the jail be discharged, and that the matter be put in hands of the Mayor.

Moved by Ald. Atwood, seconded by Ald. Conrad, that the request of Tom Martin for the use of the city team for three days to assist in removing trash from the streets, be left in the hands of the Street Committee to act. Carried.

Moved by Ald. Rix, seconded by Ald. Conrad, that the purchasing of the books for the tax roll for 1902 be left in the hands of the Assessor. Carried.

Moved by Ald. Rix, seconded by Ald. Foster, that the suggestion of Mr. French that the fire engine be fixed with a piece of galvanized pipe, be accepted, and that Mr. French be authorized to have same done. Carried.

Moved by Ald. Foster, seconded by Ald. Rix, that Mr. French be authorized to have the scraper and roller painted. Carried.

Following resolution was presented and read:

Resolved, That the Council does hereby recognize the body known as the Park Commission as a body which has the interests and beautifying of the City as their chief object. Therefore, the Council recognizes and accepts the Executive Committee of said Park Commission as an advisory board to the Council to assist by observation and advice in caring for the trees in all streets in the city and care of the parkage in general.

Moved by Ald. Atwood, seconded by Ald. Conrad, that the preceding resolution be passed. Carried.

Following resolution presented and read:

Resolved, That it is the sense of the members of the Common Council here assembled that the present contract with Adam Schantz be annulled and proceedings for a new contract be begun.

Moved by Ald. Atwood, seconded by Ald. Conrad, that the preceding resolution be passed. Carried.

Jacob Slough presented deed to right-of-way of new street opened from Pine street south, and bill for work as contracted, \$80.00. Same was referred on motion of Ald. Foster, seconded by Ald. Rix, to the Street Committee to investigate, and if found satisfactory to authorize the Clerk to pay said bill. Carried.

Moved by Ald. Foster, seconded by Ald. Conrad, that Mayor Ludwig, President Bingham and Clerk Wilkinson be appointed a committee to interview Mr. Schantz in regard to a new contract for different lighting system. Carried.

Moved by Ald. Rix, seconded by Ald. Foster, that matter of cleaning of lower Ridgewood and abutting lots be left in hands of the Mayor. Carried.

ROOSEVELT'S BAD BREAK.

President Roosevelt has shattered whatever hopes he might have had towards building up a white Republican party in the South, and at one swoop has eliminated himself from the ranks of presidential possibilities in 1904; so far as the South is concerned.

The President, in entertaining Booker T. Washington, the negro lecturer, at a family dinner recently, has willfully insulted the womanhood and manhood of this section of the country, "foolish Southern sentiment" though it may be called.

The President's appointment of ex-Governor Jones, of Alabama, to a Federal judgeship was such as to win high encomiums from the people of the South. They expected great things of him. At a blow, however, he has shattered their confidence and lost their high esteem.

As Governor Jennings said to a Tallahassee reporter, the act "was unfortunate and unpardonable." Another State officer remarked that "The President has made a serious mistake." It is the consensus of opinion that Roosevelt has made a grievous blunder.

Napoleon considered a blunder in the light of a crime. He could pardon the commission of ordinary crime with a clearer conscience than he could condone a blunder by any of his subordinates. The people will look upon Roosevelt's blunder in the same way. No man is free from mistakes. It is human to err. But when a blunder is made that could easily have been avoided, when a man allows a questionable sentiment to lead him into the commission of such an unpardonable error, the great masses will be slow to forgive.—Tallahasseean.

SILAS H. COLEMAN DEAD.

Silas H. Coleman, one of the oldest residents of Daytona, died at his home last Sunday, aged 84 years.

Mr. Coleman was a devout member of the Congregational church, and was one of Daytona's best known and influential citizens.

Funeral services were held at his late home at 1:30 o'clock Monday afternoon, after which the remains were shipped to Beaver Dam, Wisconsin for interment.

Decesed was born in Morris county, New Jersey, and was engaged in the mercantile business for many years in that state. In 1845 he removed to Juneau, Wisconsin, where he pursued the same calling. He came to Daytona about twenty-five years ago, and has ever since been actively engaged in the upbuilding of the city. He leaves to an aged wife and two sons.
