Banks Ready For Emergencies. To meet sudden and unexpected demands upon banks a large sum is kept ready for use. The average large bank—say with total assets of \$20,000,000—is prepared by four lines of defense to resist sudden attack. In the vault or safe on hand, back of that is a cash reserve of perhaps \$1,500,000 deposited in various business banks subject to instant call, back of that again is perhaps \$8,000,000 in United States and other gilt edged securities immediately marketable, and the fourth and last line of defense and to be retired upon only in extreme distress is \$6,000,000 or \$8,000,000 in bonds and mortgages, on which the mortgagors will be hurriedly called to make a payment on account if the bank is pushed to extremities. With such resources disaster would seem impossible, though it has come to the best fortified institutions.—Bookkeeper.

STATE FAIR NOTES.

Next week the fair will be in Jacksonville.

This fair had its origin in the formation of the state agricultural society nearly two years ago. This society invited the co-operation of all state organizations, especially interested in the agriculture of Florida, so that the fair is the result of the united efforts of all these different elements. The association thus formed still decided to hold the fair in Jacksonville after the great fire, fearing that a change in location would seem like a blow to the unfortunate city in its adversity. The association released the city of Jacksonville from its \$5000 guaranty and has had no funds at its disposal except the \$2500 State appropriation. This is doubtless the only State Fair ever opened with so small an outlay. This was only possible through the self-sacrifice of the officers of the association who served without pay and have defrayed most of their personal expenses. They have their reward, however, in the fact now certain, that in addition to the great industrial display there will be gathered in Jacksonville, next week, the largest and most varied display of agricultural products ever made in one place in the South.

At the fair you will see the largest man in the world; you will see the only band of Seminole Indians ever given an exhibit; you will see 30 midway shows, among the best in the country; you will see the only public display of wireless telegraphy ever made at a fair in this country except the Pan-American. Fairlyland, as it was shown at the world's fair, will be the chief night attraction.
