C. A. BACON DEAD.

Chauncey A. Bacon, of Ormond, died in Providence, R. I., the 19th of this month.

The death of this well known citizen and pioneer orange grower will sadden the hearts of many in this community, where he was so well known.

He was born in Providence in 1842. He was a soldier in the Civil War and was wounded in the charge at Fort Wagner.

In 1875 Mr. Bacon came to Florida and made a settlement on the upper Halifax River, known as Number Nine—the name being suggested by J. G. Holland's story of Seven Oaks. Here Mr. Bacon by his energy and industry and the able assistance of his wife made from a primeval wilderness a beautiful and attractive home, where nearly all the fruits suitable for this section and many of the most desirable ornamentals adorned the grounds, so that Number Nine became one of the most prominent points of interest to winter visitors.

He was an active and influential member of the Grand Army of the Republic, and prominent in the debates of the Florida Horticulture society. At one time he was a candidate for the Legislature.

In social life his geniality and humor made him a very desirable companion.

He leaves a wife and son and a host of friends to mourn his demise.
