

### EDITORS' ROAST APPEYARD.

Frank V. Baker, editor of the Seaboard Chronicle, has roasts Tom Appleyard, secretary of the Florida Press Association, for his recent circular letter to the editors of the State.

"The effort of the secretary of the Florida Press Association to entrap the State into a defence and support of Helen Wilman, charged with fraudulent use of the mails, has proven a total failure. The refusal of the editors of the State to back the defense of a person charged with fraud and under bond for violation of a United States law, was to be expected. It is the duty of the press to uphold the law, not to combine its violation, not to combat and defy its proper enforcement. The only wonder is that the secretary of the Florida Press Association managed to raise up gall enough to address the circular letter to the editors of the State. On second thought it is not of a wonder either. The boys behind the pen did not bite, and he must all likely find they can be induced to do so. It seems to the Chronicle that the secretary has transgressed his authority in the matter; and it is meet and proper that the executive committee sit down on him. As a private individual his course cuts no figure, but as secretary of an association that is pledged to law, morality and good order, he has no right to see his position to influence fellow members of an official conference to rally to the support of persons charged with violation of city law, and to allow liberty by deposit of heavy bond. If Mrs. Wilman is guilty or innocent, let the courts decide in the newspapers of the State Press Association, as an organization."

And this is they way G. F. Metcalf, the caustic editor of the West Palm Beach Tropical Sun, proceeds to put Appleyard to sleep:

"A few weeks ago T. J. Appleyard, secretary of the Florida Press Association, published in the Jacksonville Times-Union and Citizen a circular addressed to members of the association, the purport of which was an effort to entrap the State press into a defense of the Mental Scientists at Seabreeze, Helen Wilman, C. C. Post and Charles Burgman, who are now under indictment for the fraudulent use of the mails.

"Without discussing the merits or demerits of Mental Science, and, as far as possible, leaving the Seabreeze parties in question out of the case, it is quite evident to an intelligent mind that Mr. Appleyard has attempted to play his country brother for a fool, and then swallowed his own medicine. At any rate his effort has proven a miserable failure, and Appleyard stock is now below par in Florida print shops.

"It is a matter of surprise to those who know Mr. Appleyard to see him thus depart from the doctrine of the Methodist church, of which he is a member, and attempt to cover up the faults of a sect whose profession is antagonistic to the teachings of the Holy Scriptures, and who have been indicted and held under bond on a charge of violating, in a very serious manner, the laws of our nation. But more surprising still is it that a man possessed with the degree of intelligence of Mr. Appleyard, should be so ignorant as to use his official position in such a manner. As secretary of the Press Association, he has not only overstepped the bounds of reason, but he has made himself positively ridiculous.

### OLIVEROS GETS FIFTEEN YEARS

The Criminal Court at DeLand last week attracted more than usual attention. A large number of people from Daytona were in attendance at the case against G. F. Oliveros. He was found guilty of four charges. One of grand larceny of a bicycle, the property of E. B. Johnson, valued at \$25; one of grand larceny of a watch, the property of John Maloney, valued at \$20; one of petit larceny of tools, the property of H. V. Bracey, valued at \$1; and one of breaking and entering the house of Col. J. S. Crocker.

Of the four charges Oliveros was found guilty and sentenced to fifteen years in the penitentiary. Information that would enable several other charges to be lodged against him is in the possession of the State, but will probably not be used. About twenty witnesses testified against him. At first Oliveros entered a plea of "not guilty" to all the charges, but when the jury found him guilty of the first charge he changed his plea to guilty on the other three charges. The case may be appealed to the Circuit Court, Attorney Robinson, of Deland, defended the prisoner, and J. B. Parkinson, of this city, acted as Solicitor Perkins in the prosecution. The following gentlemen comprised the jury that found Oliveros guilty of the first charge of grand larceny: O. Brooke, C. W. Price, J. J. Beers, J. H. Gentry, H. J. Wilman, and George Hutchinson.

Other business attended to at the term was as follows:

Wm. Guthrie, assault and battery, pleaded guilty, \$10 or 20 days.

C. W. Lansing, threatening to accuse of crime, found guilty, but verdict set aside by the court.

John J. Holden, desertion of wife and children.

Lilla Phillips, petit larceny (stealing a bicycle), pleaded guilty, \$100 or 90 days.

Anna Meador, grand larceny; continued.

John Cranor, assault and battery; jury waived and court found guilty of assault.

Jake McLendon and Jim Bennett, killing deer out of season; pleaded guilty; fined \$5 and costs each or 20 days.

Charles Gaines and W. M. Jenkins, killing quail out of season; found not guilty.

Miles Revels and Moses Cohen, trespass on real property.

Eva Morange, imputing want of chastity; waived jury and court found not guilty.

Frank Johnson, trespass on real property; verdict of guilty; \$20 or 10 days.

Besides the jury in the Oliveros case, named above, the following served: J. W. McBride, G. W. Peterson, J. S. May, Wiley Smith, W. D. Haynes, Dan Blackwelder, A. H. Woodall and J. A. Erickson.

Major John W. Traub, of Gainesville, Florida, commissioner of the Charleston exposition, says Florida will have a fine exhibit at the exposition. ### ABOUT TO BE INCORPORATED.

In a recent conversation with Benjamin Mason and Robert I. Wall, we received the following information in reference to the land company they are interested in on the Isle of Pines. They inform us that most of the stock of the company has already been disposed of, the company having stockholders in eight states of the Union, besides a number in Havana. The company will be incorporated under the laws of the state of Iowa, and the notice of the application for charter will be published in a newspaper in that state next week.

The company is known as the Almacigos Springs Land Company. The stock is non-assessable, and the indebtedness of the corporation is limited to ten per cent of the paid-up capital. The capital stock is \$70,000, divided into 140 shares of \$500 each.

The survey of the land will be commenced next month, and as soon as it is completed tracts of twenty acres and upwards will be sold to settlers at from ten dollars per acre and upwards, according to the location. These gentlemen also inform us that quite a number of families from Iowa and other northern states, will move over and commence agricultural pursuits as soon as the surveys are completed.

Messrs. Mason and Wall, G. M. Johnson and Captain Edwin C. Smith, who are the promoters of the organization, will plot a townsite, which will be called Almacigos Springs. They have already had applications for town lots from a number of people who desire to build residences and business places. One wealthy lady from the north will shortly commence the erection of a ten thousand dollar home.

The promoters will also build a large modern hotel at Almacigos Springs. Work will be commenced on it next spring and it is expected that it will be ready for guests next winter. The hotel will be located right beside a famous warm mineral spring, and it is anticipated that owing to the delightful climate of the island, and the medicinal advantages of the spring, the hotel will do a large business. It will cost between \$12,000 and \$15,000, and will be conducted after American style. It will be strictly first class in all its appointments, and will be managed by a competent hotel man. A swimming pool will also be built near the hotel so that the guests may bathe in the waters of the spring.

One of the reasons that the Isle of Pines will be more desirable to settlers than most primeval settlements is the fact that the United States government is expending a large amount of money in building macadamized roads. Four miles of nice roads have already been built right through this company's tract and six miles more are being constructed.

Everyone who has been down to the island speak of the soil and climate in a very flattering terms, and without a doubt this little island will within a few years be one of Uncle Sam's most valuable possessions.
