A BIG FIELD FOR THE LIME.

Most of the limes now received here come from Dominica in the West Indies, says the New York Packer. There are three firms in New York who make a specialty of this article in season, which is from now on through the summer months.

Asked for some particulars of this trade, a member of the firm said: "Well, the lime trade would be in better condition today did the West Indies ship less of the article. But their whole aim seems to be for present profits, regardless of the future market."

"A few years ago we received limes from Montserrat, once a great lime juice island, but partly owing to the hurricane of recent years and to the fact that Montserrat limes are much smaller than the Dominican, the shipments from that island amount to nothing now."

The Florida lime is superior to the imported article, though it has not received the care in cultivation to bring it into popular favor. There are several points where limes are abundant, notably Hastings.

An old Florida shipper suggests in a letter to the Packer that the larger lime shippers in Florida should organize and specialize on this fruit, using some distinct package; then by agreeing to donate the fruit of one season they could reach every newspaper in the country and through these secure local notices.

He advises a package containing not over 100 limes so that a retail trade for packages could be built up by wholesale handlers. By advertising these packages retail buyers would soon learn to discriminate in favor of the Florida package.

Those who have made careful tests of the various fruit juices claim that of the Florida lime excels. They assert that experienced soda fountain men say with fresh lime juice they can produce better combinations and that many of the fancy drinks need a dash of lime juice to make them palatable.

It is for home use that limes surpass lemons even. Allowed to mature before picking, they have peculiar, piquant taste which is most refreshing. The Florida lime is the best for table use and used freely at the start the average man will want limes throughout the season.

Properly advertised the lime could be popularized and an immense and steady demand created. The California lemon was advertised and pushed until it captured the field. Just so could the Florida lime be pushed.

Daytona, April 14.—Council met in regular session with Pres. Smith in the chair. Present: Ald. Harris, Mathews, G. F. Smith, Stevens, Foster and Atwood. Minutes of previous meeting read and approved.

Communication from publishers of Gazette-News and Journal were read in regard to city printing, having both papers do printing, each receiving one-half of legal rate. Moved by Ald. Atwood, seconded by Ald. Stevens, to lay on table until next meeting; carried.

Petition and offer of E. D. McQueen to put in drain on South street was read. Moved by Ald. Harris, seconded by Ald. Mathews, to refer to Street Committee; carried. Petition from property owners abutting on Cottage avenue to have same accepted and drained by the city was read. Moved by Ald. Stevens, seconded by Ald. Smith, that the petition be granted, and that said avenue would be accepted and drained by the city after same has been decided by original owners to the city of Daytona; carried.

Bonds of city collector and treasurer were presented and referred to the city attorney to be passed upon.

An ordinance to regulate the numbering of buildings in the city of Daytona was presented and read. Moved by Ald. Atwood, seconded by Ald. Mathews, to pass same on its first reading; carried.

Moved by Ald. Harris, seconded by Ald. Foster, that interested parties be allowed to make new street signs, changing names by adding north or south as needed; carried.

Following bills presented and ordered paid: W. S. Rogers, salary, \$40.00; I. Humphries, salary, \$37.50; J. W. Wilkinson, salary, \$25.00; R. S. Maloy, bill to date, \$10.60; D. F. Morrison, feed bill, \$24.97; Adam Schantz, 4 year's street lighting, \$75.00; J. W. Wilkinson & Co., electrical work, \$28.50.

Report of Street Committee on opening Bay street into Midway showing cost would be \$100 was read, and it moved by Ald. Harris, seconded by Ald. Stevens to receive report and relieve said committee; carried. Moved by Ald. Mathews, seconded by Ald. Foster that the Ordinance Committee be instructed to draw up ordinance which shall prohibit the city from accepting any street in future less than thirty feet in width; carried. Moved by Ald. Foster, seconded by Ald. Smith, that Adam Schantz be allowed to put in fire main from Volusia avenue south along Ridgewood avenue to his property; carried.

Report of committee recommending that W. E. French be hired as Street Commissioner under the Street Committee to devote one-half of his time to such work and looking after fire engines and road scraper at the salary of \$25 per month, was read. Moved by Ald. Stevens, seconded by Ald. Mathews, to receive report and discharge committee; carried. Moved by Ald. Mathews, seconded by Ald. Foster to hire Mr. French as stated; carried.

Mr. French reported that it was not feasible to pipe water from old railroad well to engine house, but recommended a tank and guttering at cost of \$25. Moved by Ald. Foster, seconded by Ald. Harris to accept the report and authorize Mr. French to have work done; carried.

Moved by Ald. Stevens, seconded by Ald. Mathews to allow the Park Commission to trim dead limbs off of trees in park and low hanging limbs when the abutting property owners do not object; carried. Adjourned.
