The end of the legislature session is drawing near.

The Wildwood Vidette has succumbed to the hard times and is no more.

The Baker County Press is a new candidate for public favor and is a good representative of its section.

The Lake Butler Bulletin with C. N. Jones as editor has made its appearance, and is a neat and new newspaper. The TELEGRAPH welcomes the Bulletin to the field and hopes that it may live long to chronicle the events of the pretty little town in which it is published.

There seems to be an impression abroad that the annual encampments of the state troops are great, big frolics. This erroneous idea would be entirely removed from the minds of those who entertain it if they would join the boys and try the routine of camp duty for ten days.

Senator Thomas hit the railroad commission bill a hard lick when he absented himself on the day it was called up. There were other senators absent, but the absence of Mr. Thomas is more to be regretted because of the fact that he made his campaign on the railroad commission bill.

A writer in the Leesburg Commercial complains that the Jacksonville papers did not treat the soldiers outside of the First Battalion (comprising the Jacksonville and St. Augustine companies) with fairness in their reports of the drills at the late encampment. It is a fact that few companies outside of the First Battalion were ever mentioned by the metropolitan press. Whether it was because the reporters' eyes were completely filled by the handsome rank and file of the companies of the First or because of "lack of space" depend on knoweth not.

THE STATE TROOPS  
The encampment of the state troops and the effort that is being made to have the state make a more liberal appropriation for the maintenance of her militia has made that organization a topic of much discussion during the past two weeks, and it is a notable fact that with very few exceptions the criticisms of the newspapers of the state have been very favorable to the patriotic young men who serve the state in the capacity of soldiers. One of these exceptions we cannot pass unnoticed. It comes from the Tallahassee correspondent of the Jasper News and is as follows:

The annual encampment of the state militia has just consumed the usual week and the usual \$5,000 or so of the tax payer's money. In the words of the fashionable papers, it has been "an interesting function," but it would be much more interesting to learn the precise value of these picturesque picnics to the average citizen. One horseman correspondent was recently heard to characterize the entire business as a "drunken frolic, paid for by the people," and in view of the condition of the state, and its chief industry, no one need be surprised to see an attempt made to abolish the entire force.

Nevertheless those who believe in the continuance of the present programme of fuss and feathers have certain rights that cannot be denied, and among them is the privilege of supporting the bill now before the senate providing for the appropriation of an additional \$8,000 for the troops, who are understood to be badly in need of an established camp ground upon which can be given the annual exhibition of juvenile fertility. That any such bill can ever become a law is unlikely, and when the encampment breaks up tomorrow, the amateur soldiers can leave Tallahassee with the satisfaction of knowing that they are themselves largely responsible for the condition of public sentiment.

The governor reviewed the entire 900 Saturday and seemed to enjoy the spectacle. It was certainly not sufficiently picturesque, and it is to be hoped that the plain people of the state will enjoy footing the bill.

The average reader will likely imagine that the author of the foregoing unwarranted fling at 900 patriotic citizens of Florida felt that he had done himself proud when he had laid before the reading public that half column of putrid matter. But in this the average reader will be mistaken. This scribe knows it to be a fact that a highly complimen-

tary description of the encampment published in one of the Tallahassee papers and the article in the Jasper News were written by one and the same man. Therefore we must believe that he wrote the article to the Jasper News simply because he thought that the citizens of Hamilton county, having no military organization, would enjoy the insults thrown at the state troops. It is certain that in his writings he has no regard for the truth, or he could not have censured the soldiers in one breath and praised them in the next, and no one need pay any attention to his criticisms.

It is pleasant to turn from the insolence of this so-much-a-column machine to the following editorial from the Sunterville Times. The Times is published in a county that has no military organization, but it will be remembered that the troops went to the rescue when the lives of the citizens of Wildwood were in jeopardy, and the prompt manner in which the mob of assassins at that place were put to rout has likely given the Times its high estimate of the worth of the militia:

The recent encampment of the Florida State troops on Leon Heights at Tallahassee has demonstrated Florida's exact strength in armed militia that may be used in the enforcing of the present laws or those that may be enacted in the future.

With a view to economy, many have suggested that appropriations for this purpose be done away with and the militia disbanded. Past experience has shown that none can tell just when the troops will be needed nor for what purpose. Every soldier is under oath to support the constitution of the United States and Florida and is subject to the commands of the governor. The encampment at the state capital has shown the soldiers to have been well drilled, and their actions while under the lax discipline of peaceful times, have been such as to call forth expressions of approbation from the governor and members of the legislature, and has completely reversed the impression which has heretofore existed that the troops merely go to state encampments to have a big time and commit depredations upon the surrounding community.

They are the safeguard of the state and should be fostered by the state government. A suitable appropriation should be made for the next encampment and even in its present condition the state could well afford to furnish a fatigue uniform once every three years.
