Commissioners' Proceedings.

The board of county commis-
sioners met in regular session
Tuesday, April 3d. Members all
present.

Action on the petition for a
public road from Guilford to Provi-
dence was postponed until the next
regular meeting of the board.

A petition for a public road from
Highland to Railford was received
and ordered advertised by posting
for thirty days.

The time for the collection of
state and county taxes was extend-
ed to May 15, 1900.

An appropriation of \$15 for the
assistance of Mrs. Mattie Wynn,
of Lake Butler, was made by the
board, and the amount was placed
with Commissioner Crews to be
expended for her maintenance
during the next thirty days.

W. W. Sapp was appointed in-
spector of marks and brands for
election district No. 6.

A petition asking the board to
build a bridge across bluff creek
at the Walton ford was laid over
until the next meeting.

W. W. Chapman, lessee of the
county convicts, filed his monthly
report, paying over to the board
the sum of \$10.

Cost bill in the case of the state
vs Rufus Taylor was refused pay-
ment.

Bills were approved and warrants
ordered drawn against the several
funds as follows:

General, bridge and bond, \$277-
64; pauper, \$78.50; fine and for-
feiture, \$179.54; total, \$535.68.

The board adjourned until the
first Tuesday in May.

Mills-Cone.

in this city Saturday evening,
at 8 o'clock, Elder Robert Keith
officiating.
