### Mr. Jones Speaks at Worthington.

Special Correspondence to the TELEGRAPH.

Your correspondent had the pleasure of attending a picnic at Worthington Springs on the Fourth, and listening to the eloquence of our county candidates. It was estimated that 1,000 people were present and all thoroughly enjoyed the day.

Mr. N. J. Jones, of Starke, who is an avowed candidate for state senator, was present and addressed the large gathering of citizens on the topics of the day. Following is a condensed report of his speech:

"Ladies and Gentlemen:—I am glad to be with you on this occasion, not that I think my talk will specially interest you, but because this is the last Fourth of July we will have the pleasure of celebrating together during the 19th century. Again, it affords those who do not know me an opportunity to see who the candidate is for the state senate from Bradford county this year. At the Long bridge picnic, on the 20th of June, I formally announced myself a prospective candidate, and now I announce myself a candidate in fact.

"I do not enter the senatorial contest this year not knowing the duties and responsibilities that rest upon a senator. I know that candidates do not walk into office in pathways strewn with flowers, neither do they reach the senatorial chamber on flowery beds of ease; therefore, gentlemen, if I am elected I know my duties as a senator and will fulfill them.

"I am not disposed to censure our state and county officials for the present high rate of taxation. If it takes that amount of money to run the state and county government, it takes it, and the remedy must begin in the halls of legislation.

"I have in mind some other ways to reduce taxes besides that of a short session of the legislature, of which I have previously spoken, which I will put in execution if elected."

Your correspondent heard many favorable comments on the speech of Mr. Jones. He is looked upon as a man who is in touch with senators, who, like himself, have power and influence to do good, and a great many persons present at Worthington on the Fourth expressed the thought that we could not afford to lose the services of this influential man.

### OFF TO THE CHAIN GANG.

Hewitt Brothers Have Now Entered On Their Long Sentence.

Having failed to secure the supersedeas bond of \$10,000 each Moss, Dick and Lum Hewitt have now been committed to the state chain gang to begin the service of a life time sentence for the killing of J. T. Johnson, two years ago, in the western part of this county. They passed through Starke Monday under guard en route to the convict camps at Wade in Alachua county, where they have now been put to work in the phosphate mines. Chained with them was Tom Hammond, who killed his grandmother, aunt and uncle in Duval county a few months ago; Henry Shugart, convicted of forgery, and M. B. King, a negro convicted of aiding and abetting a murderer in Duval county.

While their cheerful outward manner had not forsaken them it was easy to see that the Hewitt brothers now realize the awful condition that confronts them. There is now no hope for them except through the interference of the supreme court and it is believed by persons who have followed the case closely that that tribunal will sustain the verdict of the lower court. That being the case there is nothing but a life of servitude before these young men, the oldest of whom is scarcely 33 years of age and the youngest only 21. Moss, the elder brother, leaves a wife and children; Dick leaves a child, his wife having died while he was in jail; and Lum leaves a widowed mother, who was dependent upon him for support. The picture is an awful one and should be a warning to persons who are tempted to take the life of a fellow being.
