Things That Are Happening in Florida as Told by Our Exchanges.

A large number of settlers have arrived in Ocala from their former home St. Louis, Mo. The party has moved out to their new homes, the Johnson tract of 150 acres of splendid land, 125 of which is in cultivation. The land was purchased last spring when several of the gentlemen were here and inspected.

Will and Paul de Mendicis, two young men of New Augustine, are under arrest in the hands of U. S. officials charged with breaking and entering the New Augustine post office. The using of postage due stamps on letters mailed by the young men led to their arrest.

It was rather amusing to see the crowd that gathered on the main streets Saturday gazing skyward in faint hopes of catching sight of an air ship that was to leave Pensacola about noon. The hour, we do not know how, their expectations were null and void as nothing that could be called such has shown up yet.—DeLand Breeze.

Discussing the damage to the Cuban tobacco crop by the recent storm, a Tampa manufacturer is quoted by the Times as follows: "Mr. Antonino declared that the best business man from the Pinar del Rio district just before leaving, who informed him that words were not sufficient to describe the damage which had been done in the province, where a great deal of leaf had been ruined. One of the heaviest losers in Havana proper was the house of Potack, who sustained the loss of some 700 bales of fine wrappers. Salt water coming up into the warehouses was responsible for much of the tobacco damage in the city. The price of leaf immediately soared upward some 30 to 50 per cent. It was high already, but as soon as the news from Pinar del Rio arrived, and the losses at Havana occurred, it went the market. Many of the leaf dealers simply declared they were not in the market when approached after the storm, they evidently holding back for a still higher market."—Key West Citizen.

Freeman Sawyer, an employee of the U. S. L. Ry., fell from the engine while driving train No. 11 yesterday water being Wednesday night and narrowly escaped death. The wheels of car next to the engine passed his head and Dr. Hening found it necessary to amputate his fingers. The hand was badly mangled and will cause the young man to be a cripple for life.—Waldo News.

During the height of the storm during October, what was apparently a tidal wave crossed over Lake Okechobee, south on the west side house, fell camps and everything movable was swept away. The occupants escaped by climbing trees building on to floating timbers and swimming. The water rose about six feet above the bank and overflowed the entire country surrounding the lake. Hundreds of hogs ranging near the lake were drowned by the sudden rise of the water.

As a result of the recent cold wave in Jacksonville there were 21 alarms of fire sent in inside of 36 hours, caused from defective stoves and heaters, the total loss amounting to about \$300.

A survey of the Florida East Coast Railway extension shows that the damage done in the storm was comparatively small. A few barges and small boats were sunk, tents were blown down and temporary structures washed out, but the concrete piers stood the test and trains are being operated on the extension. The total amount of damage will probably not exceed \$2,000.

Considerable street paving is to be done in Perry at once. The contract calls for four miles of macadamized streets, 16 feet wide, 6 inches in the center and 4 inches on the edge in thickness. Work obtained about six miles from that town will be used in the construction.

N. G. Wade & Co., the well-known contractors, have been awarded the contract for the construction of 63 miles of new railroad extending from Winter Haven, south through Frostproof and Avon Park to Lake Jackson, some twelve miles beyond the latter place. The road will open up some of the finest land in Florida and will serve as a feeder to the Coast Line system and incidentally to Lakeland which will be the nearest large town.

Blood will tell. It seems that the paternal grandfather of the late lamented N. B. Broward was a man of great force and a leader before and after the cessation of Florida to the United States. He was appointed colonel by the Spanish governor and cleaned up the pirates who tried to make Fernandina headquarters. As a reward for his bravery and valuable services the governor gave him several thousand acres of land in Duval county. An old document brought to light shows the colonel to have been a worthy grand sire of the old filibuster just gathered to hill fathers. An aunt also was among the brave Southern matrons who cheered and encouraged the Florida boys to go to the front and fight and die in the stripes. Governor Broward's ancestors were not the ignorant poor wretches frequently described.—Barlow Record.

The first Postal Savings Bank will be installed in Key West. Only one of each state will be tried as an experiment.

The Lee County News of Fort Myers has a column taken from the Pittsburg, Pa., Gazette-Times about Mr. Edison's display at the late land show in that city. It says Mr. Edison owns 15,000 acres of the best land in Lee county, is one of the most enthusiastic boomers of Fort Myers and Lee county and that he supplied at his own expense and planted two rows, each a mile long, of palm trees on the street on which he has his winter home. Mr. Edisson is always ready to do anything he can to advance the interests of Fort Myers.

R. E. Rose, state chemist, has issued a book on "Sugar Production in Florida," which contains much valuable information on this important branch of agriculture. Captain Rose writes from personal experience, for he was at one time one of the largest growers of sugar cane in the south.

General Sam Pasco of Monticello, was made major-general commanding the Florida Division of the United Confederate Veterans at the recent reunion held in Bartow.

Jacksonville's new automobile ordinance has gone into effect. Restrictions are placed on speed, and other precautions are taken to protect the public.

On Monday night, in Tallahassee, Governor Gilchrist appeared in the title role of a play, "A Bachelor's Reverie," which was written by Miss Sarah O. Freeland, a talented Jacksonville newspaper woman. The play was given under the auspices of the Tallahassee Woman's Club for the benefit of the new club house soon to be built. Governor Gilchrist's friendship for many of the members of the club, caused him to descend for a short time from the dignities of his high office, in order that the club might raise money for their new home.

The census of the United States, as at present taken, is a farce. It is now nearly 1911—and the result of the census of last summer will not be known until nearly a year after it was taken. W. H. Halsey, who took the census in DeLand, has not yet been paid for his work. If other employees of the census department are not more promptly paid it is no wonder that prompt work is not done.—DeLand News.

All telegraph and telephone wires are to be put under ground in Jacksonville.

At least 300 people visited the haunted house near DeLand Landing Sunday, property of the late Moses Marsh, to witness some of the queer things that have taken place there, such as a heavy rock, weighing perhaps 30 or 30 pounds, that has been lying around the house for the past twenty or thirty years picked itself up, carried itself into an adjoining room and broke into two pieces. Four pairs of shoes belonging to a few of the children, set on the floor, began to walk upstairs, while the family looked on, and no feet nor hands touched them. A fishing rod, a heavy turned column, a sewing machine and many other articles, came down stairs of their own accord. These stories excited no little interest in the haunted place, and during the past week the road from DeLand to the house, about six miles away, has been worn to a frazzle. Some people who have visited the scene have experienced some of the strange and unaccountable phenomena.

An old Seminole Indian, Cropped Charlie, was in Danja recently. The old fellow claims to be 75 years old. He said the glades was a big pond with more water in it than he had ever seen.

Indications are that the new Clarendon Hotel at Daytona Beach will be completed by December 10th. Practically three train loads of furniture have arrived. All carpets will be laid, and all window shades, draperies and awnings will be put up by the makers. The Clarendon will be one of the finest hotels on the east coast when completed.

The British steamer Baltic Sea, arrived at Pensacola Sunday from London with three thousand tons of chalk for a whitening factory. If any political aspirants need such an article the supply is unlimited.

Miss Lizzie Rosch, a highly respected young lady of Williston, while doing some washing at her home last week had her clothing to catch fire and she was so badly burned that death resulted.

Sixty-five expert cigar makers, men and women, left Pittsburg, Pa., last week to work in the cigar factories at Tampa. The strike is practically over and most of the factories have resumed business. The charges against the cigar makers for complicity, riot, etc., fell flat for lack of evidence.

Last Monday the warring picture industry was begun in Jacksonville, and the Selig Polyscope Company has engaged Dixieland Park for this new industry. The outfit contains 160 trained animals and from 50 to 60 men. One part of the equipment is fifteen real American Indians.
