DEMOCRATIC HOUSE.

According to Roster Published, Democrats Have 227 Members.

The democratic representation in the next Congress will be 227 as against 163 republicans and one socialist, according to the roster of the house published at Washington, D. C.

These figures give the democrats a majority of 63 and a plurality of 64.

According to this publication, Kansas is the only state of size which has a solid republican delegation. A number, however, contain only one democrat, among those thus included being Iowa, Minnesota, California and Wisconsin.

All of the southern states have solid democratic delegations except Maryland, Virginia, Kentucky and Tennessee. Maryland and Virginia each have one republican, while Tennessee and Kentucky each have two members of that party.

Colorado is the only northern state represented entirely by democrats, but Indiana, possessing a much larger representation, presses close upon her heels with 12 democrats out of 13 members.

Illinois has 11 democrats in her membership of 25; Massachusetts 4 out of 14; Michigan 2 out of 12; New Jersey 7 out of 10; New York 23 out of 37; Ohio 18 out of 26, and Pennsylvania 9 out of 32.

Missouri's delegation consists of 13 democrats and 3 republicans.

The Nebraska delegation is evenly divided, 3 and 3, as is Maine's, 2 and 2. Oklahoma has 3 republicans and 3 democrats. Washington is represented by 2 republicans. All of the states having no representative only are republicans.

COLLETHORPE HONORED.

Celebration at Savannah in Memory of Founder.

At Savannah, Ga., a statue of General James Oglethorpe, in bronze, was unveiled on Wednesday in his honor as founder of the city in 1733, and of the English colony of Georgia and foundation stone in many of the great edifices that are now the South Atlantic states.

The statue was surrounded in British and American flags and then was displayed before throngs of distinguished visitors and thousands of Georgia people when Governor Joseph M. Brown, of Georgia, and Mrs. J. J. Wilder, state president of the Colonial Dames, drew tant the ribbons that released the flag's silken folds.

Their act officially opened the three days of festivities that honored the memory of the founder of Georgia.

The occasion was one of exceptional interest and importance, as it marked a great historical event.

The festivities lasted for three days and the city was crowded with important personages during the celebration.

NEGRO IS LYNCHED BY FLORIDA MOB

Was Found in Bed Room of Prominent Man's Daughter.

JAIL IS BROKEN INTO

Negro Was Taken to a Telegraph Pole Near the Railroad Track and Strung Up—His Body Riddled by Bullets.

Richard Lowe, a negro, was quietly lynched several miles outside Mayo, Fla., for entering the bedroom of the daughter of R. M. Cobb, in the heart of Mayo.

Cobb was awakened by his daughter's screams, and went to investigate. As he entered the room the negro jumped through the window.

A searching party was sent out and arrested the negro, who was later identified by a portion of his coat.

A crowd of some forty men gathered quietly and easily affected an entrance into the jail. The mob carried the negro outside the city and swung him up to a telegraph pole alongside the railroad. After the negro's body was riddled with bullets the mob dispersed.

DIED FROM SNAKE BITE.

Chasing a Rabbit, Man is Bitten by a Large Rattlesnake.

Mr. Samuel Kinch, of Butler, Pa., died at the Marion county hospital from the effects of a rattlesnake bite, received while out hunting. In trying to capture a rabbit which he had chased into a hole, Mr. Kinch put his hand in the hole and was bitten three times by the snake. He was brought to Ocala immediately, but his case was already past medical aid.

Fortunately the train was moving slowly and the occupants of the car escaped injury. The car was totally wrecked.
