Dr. E. E. Philbrick sent a pair of his fine carrier pigeons to Jacksonville to be liberated this week.


Miss Cora Goldstucker, of Pensacola, who has been the guest of Mrs. Alex. Jacobs for the past three months, has returned to her home.


