NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN OF THE INTENTION of the undersigned to apply to the Governor of the State of Florida, after publication of this notice once in each of four weeks, for letters patent incorporating them, their associates and successors, into a body politic and corporate, by the name of D. R. Cox Furniture Company, for the purposes and on the terms set forth in their proposed charter, a copy of which is given below.

We, the undersigned, do hereby associate ourselves for the purpose of becoming incorporated under the laws of the State of Florida, to transact for profit the business hereinafter set forth, and we do adopt the following as the charter of the proposed corporation:

The name of the corporation shall be D. R. Cox Furniture Company, and its principal place of business shall be at Tallahassee, Leon county, Florida; but the Board of Directors may, in their discretion, change the place of business for said corporation within and without the State of Florida.

The general nature of the business to be transacted by the company is the buying, selling and dealing in furniture, and house furnishings of all kinds, and the conducting of a general furniture store, or stores, for the sale, either at wholesale or retail, of all such goods, wares and merchandise as are usually kept for sale in such an establishment; the engaging in and conducting of a general mercantile business, at wholesale or retail, or both; the buying and selling of goods, wares, merchandise and chattels of every kind and character; and the buying, selling, holding, mortgaging, selling and conveying of real property.

The amount of the capital stock shall be twenty thousand dollars, to be divided into two hundred shares of one hundred dollars each. The entire capital stock shall be fully paid for by the assignment and transfer to the company of the stock of any three, goods and merchandise recently purchased of the executive of the late H. D. Hart, in the city of Tallahassee, by the subscribers.

The said company shall exist for twenty years, unless sooner dissolved.

The business of the company shall be conducted by the following officers, viz: A President, a Vice-President, a Secretary and a Treasurer, and a Board of Directors, consisting of five stockholders; and by such subordinate officers as the Board of Directors may appoint. The office of Secretary and Treasurer may be filled by the same person, and the Board of Directors shall be elected by the stockholders at their annual meeting, to be held on the first Wednesday of November of each year, and the Board of Directors shall elect the other officers of the company. The following persons shall be the officers to conduct the business of the company until those elected at the first election shall be qualified, viz: W. L. Moor, President; A. B. Blackburn, Vice-President; D. R. Cox, Secretary and Treasurer; and W. L. Moor, A. B. Blackburn, D. R. Cox, E. C. Moor and G. H. Gwynn, Directors.

The highest amount of indebtedness or liability to which the company can at any time subject itself shall be twenty thousand dollars.
