#### Fire Sunday, 13th District No. 25. "Brad" Catches the Coon.

Chief Hamlin, followed by Bass, Byrd and Policeman Haws, put out after the little rascals, and saw them in a patch of broom sedge near the cemetery, one crying and the other running. Chief and Bass stopped to console the weeping one, while "Brad" and Policeman Haws chased the other little one. The chase was a lively one, as the little negro had evidently had lessons in "sprinting" before.

"Brad" finally runs him to bay and brings him back to the alarm box. Both of the coons were too small to punish, so one was let loose. The little runner was carried to the "boose" and locked up for an hour. This is the first "false alarm" in some time, and caused the department considerable trouble in turning out. This was also the first "false alarm" that has been caught, and the first arrest made by a fireman. Byrd, had a cottage there, and it also was burned.

The fire started in the kitchen of the Inn and spread rapidly. The hotel was owned by the C. T. & G. Railroad, and the general impression seems to be that it will not be rebuilt.
