### Smith Gets Contract

Beginning this morning S. D. Smith one of the well-known and substantial men of Navajo County, takes over the job of carrying the United States Mail from Holbrook to St. Johns Springerville and Eagar.

Under Mr. Smith's contract, the first and second class mails will run on schedule covering the 110 miles from Holbrook to Eagar in fourteen hours. It will leave Holbrook at ten o'clock and will be due in Eagar at midnight. During good weather at least of course this schedule will be considerably lowered, and the people of St. Johns will probably receive their mail about three o'clock in the afternoon.

In the future there will be no mail on Sundays but this will not be a great inconvenience, as it has been next to impossible to get into the post-office on the Sabbath in the past without a longseige of 'watchful waiting'.

The Contractor now has five days in which to get third and fourth class matter over the route, but as parcel post shipments to points in this section are now running over a half ton each day, every effort will be used to rush this line through, in order to prevent accumulation at the railroad end.

L. C. Updike will have charge of local station and will handle the express and passenger for Mr. Smith. He has a good location for this and will doubtless give the patrons the same energetic attention that has characterized all of his operations here.

Mr. Smith has four cars on the road now and is prepared to handle express and passenger business as well as the mails. There will probabele no change in the present rates and as business demands, more cars will be added.

To Tax Payers of Apache County Office of the Treasurer and Ex-Officio Tax Collector of Apache, Arizona.

Notice is hereby given that the Duplicate Assessment Roll of Apache County, for the year 1914, is now in my possession for collection of taxes levied therein; that said taxes are now due and payable at the office of the County Treasurer and Tax collector, located in the Navajo-Apache Bank and Trust Company, at St. Johns, Apache County, and that said taxes will become delinquent on the second Monday in December, (December 7th.) 1914, at five o'clock P. M.; and that unless paid on that day or prior thereto, four per cent will be added to the amount thereof as penalty, and interest from time of delinquency, at the rate of ten per cent per annum until paid.

School and Road tax will be assessed to all, not in possession of such Tax Receipts, or not legally exempt.

Payment may be made at the office of the treasurer between the hours of nine A. M. and five P. M. until date of delinquency.
