

## Farm Improvement Association

### ARTICLE I—NAME

This organization shall be known as the.....Farm Improvement Association.

### ARTICLE II—OBJECT

The object of this organization shall be to improve farms and farm life throughout this locality.

1st. By co-operating with other local farmers' organizations, and by affiliating with the County and State Farm Improvement Associations.

2nd. By disseminating adapted varieties of seeds, plants and livestock among its members.

3rd. To put on the market through the Secretary or other appropriate officer or committee, any selected seeds, plants, livestock or other farm products, that its members may wish to dispose of.

4th. To purchase any farm or household supplies that may be deemed necessary.

5th. To co-operate with the Agricultural Extension Service of the University of Arizona College of Agriculture in carrying on systematic investigations, experiments and demonstrations to determine the best farm practice for the various sections of this locality.

6th. To promote fairs, institutes, farm advisors, agricultural high schools, cow-testing associations, boys' and girls' clubs, etc., through the activity of its members, directed by committees.

7th. By distributing agricultural literature among its members.

8th. By holding monthly meetings.

### ARTICLE III—MEMBERSHIP

Sec. 1. ACTIVE MEMBERS: Anyone actively engaged in farming as business or profession in the vicinity of ..... (farmers, farmers' wives, investigators and teachers), are entitled to vote and hold office. Annual dues shall be ..... (To include membership in the County and State Improvement Association.)

Sec. 2. ASSOCIATE MEMBERS: Anyone interested, but not actively engaged, in agriculture, (real estate men, railroad officials, bankers, etc., are not entitled to vote and hold office. Annual dues shall be.....

Sec. 3. JUNIOR MEMBERS: Agricultural students and members of boys' and girls' clubs; are not entitled to vote and hold office. Annual dues shall be.....

HONORARY MEMBERS: This title to be conferred by special vote of the Association; are entitled to all privileges of members. There shall be no dues for honorary members.

Sec. 5. Any applicant for membership must be approved by an officer or member of the Executive Committee of this Association and shall be enrolled as a member by the Secretary on receipt of approved application accompanied by annual dues, according to preceding sections of this article.

### ARTICLE IV—OFFICERS

Sec. 1. The officers of this Association shall consist of a President, two Vice-Presidents, Secretary, Treasurer, Councilman and Alternate Councilman, whose terms of office shall be one year or until their successors are elected. The Secretary and Treasurer may be one and the same person.

Sec. 2. The Councilman and Alternate Councilman may be chosen from among the other Officers of this Association.

### ARTICLE V—DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Sec. 1. It shall be the duty of the President to preside at all meetings of

the Association and enforce the observance of such rules and regulations as will be for the best interests of the organization; to appoint all regular committees as he may deem expedient for the welfare of the Association. The President shall fill all vacancies in offices or committees by appointment. He shall call all meetings by order of the Executive Committee.

Sec. 2. In the absence of the President, the Vice-President shall preside and perform all the duties of the President. Each Vice-President shall be the active official representative of this Association in his particular section of his locality.

Sec. 3. It shall be the duty of the Secretary to keep all records of the association; to report the result of the various activities of the association; and to labor for the welfare of the organization in general.

Sec. 4. The Treasurer shall collect fees, keep secure all funds of the Association, and pay out money on the written order of the Secretary, signed

Sec. 5. The Councilman, or the Alternate Councilman in the absence of the former, or both if desired, shall attend the monthly meeting of the Advisory Council of the ..... F. I. P. They shall convey to that body the desires of this association, and shall report to this association at its next meeting following the County meeting a full account of the proceedings of the Advisory Council meeting. The necessary traveling expenses of the Councilman or Alternate Councilman shall be defrayed by this Association.

### ARTICLE VI—COMMITTEES

The standing committees of this Association shall be appointed by the President as follows: Executive, which shall consist of the president, secretary and three other members, County Projects, Membership, Crops, Improvement, Co-operative Demonstration, Marketing, Rural Credit, Legislation, Schools, Roads, Irrigation, Dry-Farming, Cattle, Sheep, Hogs, Dairying, Poultry, Publicity, and such other committees as may be deemed necessary.

### ARTICLE VII—AMENDMENTS

This constitution may be amended at any annual meeting by a two-thirds vote of the members of the Association present.

### By-Laws

ARTICLE I. The officers of the association shall be elected by ballot at an annual meeting.

ARTICLE II. This association shall be governed by Roberts' Rules of Order.
