Senobia Cordova an aged and respected citizen of St. Johns passed to that great beyond last Monday morning between the hours of 2 and 3 o'clock.

Mr. Cordova has lived here for the past 35 or 40 years and has always lived a peaceful quiet life. He had reached the ripe old age of 80 years.

For the past 10 or 15 years he has lived on the bank of the Little Colorado river just across the bridge but the flood last April swept his home away.

He leaves a wife and one son to mourn for him besides some grand children and many relatives.

The funeral services were held at the Catholic Church, Wednesday and the remains were laid to rest in the east side Cemetery, where they will await the call of the resurrection angel.
