Senator Hubbel takes Big Hauling Contract.

The Navajo Copper company has let a contract to J. Lorenzo Hubbell of Ganado, for the hauling of their ore from their storage bins to Flagstaff. The ore will be brought across the greater part of the way to the bins, over the heavy sand roads by caterpillar trucks.

Senator Hubbell says the number of teams he will put on the haul will depend on the number of tons of ore the company can deliver at the bins. He is ready to put on a hundred teams if necessary to handle the work.

Many tons of ore have been stacked up ready for the caterpillar haul and Senator Hubbell will soon have teams handling his end of the work. He will also run a commissary store at both ends of the haul.—Coconino Sun.
