SUPERVISOR PROCEEDINGS

Minutes of the Board of Supervisors, Apache County.

St. Johns, Ariz., Apr. 18, 1917.
Pursuant to adjournment the Board of Supervisors met in regular adjourned session on this date; there being present Chairman Heber Jarvis, Members John C. Hall and W. A. Saunders, and Levi S. Udall, clerk.

Minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved as read.

Surety Bond of Mrs. Montie Love as Notary Public, in the sum of \$1000.00 was approved by the Chairman.

County Assessor J. A. Mineer, appeared before the Board and presented a letter from Governor Campbell ordering him to make a Military enrollment of all male citizens, between the ages of 18 and 45 years of age, residing within the county; he asked that the board allow him the necessary help and expenses to enable him to make this enrollment in the shortest time possible. The board unanimously agreed to allow him all necessary expenses incurred in making this enrollment.

The petition of Idelfonso Olivarez of Concho, Ariz. asking the Board to allow him Out Door relief in the sum of \$15.00 per month was rejected by the Board.

Alex. Shreeve the present janitor of the court house buildings having tendered his resignation to the board, effective May 1st., and Alejandro Pena having made application to the Board for the position, upon motion and by unanimous vote he was appointed as janitor at a salary of \$25.00 per month, said appointment effective from and after May 1st, 1917.
